Bronze Plaque in Honour of Late Sylvester Kennedy Unveiled at S. Porcupine

Touching and Simple Ceremony in Front of South Porcupine Public School. Address by Mr. J. H. Stovel. Ode by Mrs. Maxwell-Smith. Wreaths of Laurel Placed Before Plaque.

South Porcupine, Sept. 18.—(Special to The Advance)—A touching and simple ceremony took place on Wednesday afternoon at 3 p.m. when the bronze plaque, placed upon the stone erected in front of the Public School, dedicated to the late Vesty Kennedy, was unveiled by his daughter, Miss Pearl Kennedy. Before the senior classes of the Dome and South Porcupine Public Schools the members of the School Board, and all the oldtimers and public spirited citizens of our town who formed a circle round the monument, Miss Kennedy, untied the white ribbon holding the Union Jack in place over the stone, and the inscription was revealed.
