Most of you know the building as it housed the town library for many years. It is true that he was repaid for it but that does not take away from the fact that he supplied the building when there was no other way of getting it. It is an apt illustration of how much he had at heart the education of the children.

"I was associated with him for five years on your school board and I found him ever ready to co-operate for what he thought was right. Indeed, if he thought the rest of us were wrong, he was quite willing to fight for his ideas in his typical Irish way. Our association led me to have a very high regard for him, which I am sure is shared by every one present. His friends knew his worth much better than I can tell them of it.

"After Miss Kennedy unveils the plaque, we will listen to a poem specially written for the occasion by Mrs. Maxwell-Smith. This will be recited by one of the scholars in whom he took such an interest."


