### TOWN OF TIMMINS

#### TAKE NOTICE THAT:

1. The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Timmins intends to open and construct as a Local Improvement the following streets:

(1) A Street to be known as Ninth Avenue, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, thirty-three feet on each side of, and measured perpendicularly from a line as follows: the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale, from the east boundary of North Road to the west boundary of Tamarack Street;

(2) A Street to be known as Elm Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Elm Street from the north limit of Plan M-74 Temiskaming, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

(3) A Street to be known as Maple Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Maple Street, from the north limit of Plan M74 Temiskaming, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

(4) A Street to be known as Birch Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Birch Street, from the north limit of Plan M74 Temiskaming, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

(5) A Street to be known as Balsam Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Balsam Street, from the north limit of Plan M74 Temiskaming, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

(6) A Street to be known as Cedar Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Cedar Street from the north limits to Plans M74 Temiskaming and M58 Cochrane, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

(7) A Street to be known as Pine Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Pine Street from the north limits of Plan M58 Cochrane, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

(8) A Street to be known as Spruce Street, being a strip of land sixty-six feet in width, formed by projecting the east and west boundaries of Spruce Street from the north limits of Plan M58 Cochrane, to a line parallel to and thirty-three feet south of the line between the north half and the south half of the south half of Lot twelve in the third concession of the Township of Tisdale;

and intends to specially assess a part of the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work and upon the following land which is immediately benefited by the work:

NW 1/4 S 1/2 Lot 12, Con. III, Tisdale; Lots 22-34 inclusive; 37-62 inclusive; 65-90 inclusive; 93-105 inclusive, as shown on Plan M43 Cochrane;

2. The estimated cost of the work is \$10,540.00, of which \$989.65 is to be paid by the Corporation. The estimated cost per foot frontage is \$8.1065. The special assessment is to be paid in ten equal annual instalments and the estimated annual rate per foot frontage is twelve cents.

3. Application will be made by the Corporation to the Ontario Municipal Board for its approval of the undertaking of the said work and any owner may within twenty-one days after the first publication of this notice file with the Board his objection to the said work being undertaken.

4. The said Board may approve of the said work being undertaken but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objections to the said work will be considered.

McKenzie Island is in Red Lake, Dome Township, north western Ontario 170 miles from Hudson Station on the Canadian National Railway. It has of late become the centre of an active mining community of several thousand people, with three active gold mines and another one on the point of coming into production. The Howie, pioneer gold mine of the Red Lake District is on the main line 4 1/2 miles away. McKenzie Island now boasts a bank as well as an hotel, a theatre, a hospital, a school and several stores. Communication with the railway means 170 miles by motor launch or by plane. Heavy freight goes by wagon or sleigh road. Since before the discovery of Cobalt, Imperial Bank has pioneered with the pioneers in the North Country.

Had Resided in Timmins for Several Years.

Funeral services were held this (Thursday) morning at the Church of the Nativity for the late Mrs. Margaret Spencer, who died on Tuesday, October 1st, at the home of her nephew Mr. Owen Farnan, 23 Kimberley avenue, after an illness of about six months.
