## Outstanding Double Feature Bill at the Cartier Theatre

Friday and Saturday Cartier Showing "Laddie" and "Laughing at Danger."

The double feature programme at the Cartier theatre on Friday and Saturday, Nov. 15th and 16th is an unusually pleasing one. Either of the two feature pictures would be a good show in itself. Together they are spec-

ially attractive. One of the features is "Laddie" and the other, "Laughing at Danger."

"Laddie," one of Gene Stratton Porter's most distinguished works, comes to the screen with all the appeal, all the vigorous drama, all the imaginative touches of the novel, all authentic to the last detail of costume and locale and character and story.

With Tim Holt in the title role "Laddie" is the story of the romance between a farm boy and a beautiful girl, the daughter of a proud and aloof father who forbids the relationship. How Laddie's younger sister worms her way into the adamant parent's heart, allays his bitterness over his disbraced son and brings the young couple's parents together brings the absorbing film to a heart-warming, entertaining conclusion.

A two-million-copy best seller, "Laddie" was directed by Jack Hively for RKO Radio with Virginia Gilmore, a lovely newcomer, as the romantic heroine; Joan Carroll, Ginger Rogers' impish sister in "Primrose Path," as Laddie's younger sister; and Spring Byington as the farm boy's mother.

"Laughing at Danger" is said to be Frankie Darro's most hilarious comedy-mystery. The picture is one of Monogram's effective productions and the cast is a capable one.

Seen in the romantic leads are Joy Hodges, who plays the role of a beauty operator, and George Houston, who portrays a detective. Ironically enough these two performers who first got their start in motion pictures as vocalists, do not sing in "Laughing at Danger." Other important leads include Mantan Moreland, popular colored comedian, Veda Ann Borg, Guy Usher and Lilian Elliott.

## Palace Presenting One of Year's Best Films, "Hell Below"

War and Romance in Entertaining Picture.

Thundering thrills of naval battles and an intimate panorama of the sailors of the submarine fleet form a huge background for romance in "Hell Below," in which Robert Montgomery, Walter Huston, Madge Evans, Eugene Palette, Robert Young and a large supporting cast are playing at the Palace theatre, Friday, Friday midnight and Saturday, November 15 and 16.

Submarines battle airplanes, and a whole fort is blown up in a remarkable episode in which a harbor full of enemy destroyers is bottled up. Against this crescendo accompaniment is the simple love story of a lieutenant who falls in love with the daughter of his commander.

Montgomery does the finest work of his film career as Lieutenant Knowlton who in the end sacrifices his love for his duty. It is a straight, honest portrayal, at all times sympathetic and convincing. Huston contributes a performance of distinction to the talk-

ies as the stern commander of the submarine. Madge Evans, more stunning than ever, was an excellent choice for the feminine lead, and the riotous Jimmy had another of his inimitable laugh roles as the ship's cook who is drawn into a boxing match with a kangaroo.

The excellent cast also includes Eugene Palette, Robert Young, Edwin Styles, John Lee Hahn, David Newell, Sterling Holloway, and Charles Irwin. The photography of this picture is something to talk about, particularly the brilliant underwater scenes, the like of which have never before been shown on the screen. Much of the credit for the excellent of the production must go to Jack Conway, its director, who has engineered his scenes with a compelling and discerning hand.

Pictures as entertaining as "Hell Below" are not released every day. This one presents another high-water mark in the annals of Hollywood productions.

### Royal Canadian Air Force Seeks Many Radio Experts

North Bay, Nov. 13—The Royal Canadian Air Force needs radio mechanics and cooks, according to Captain G. W. C. Kinney, in charge of the R.C.A.F. recruiting depot at North Bay.

### Free Hollanders Raising Large Fund for Spitfires

London.—Among the heroes of recent German bombing raids on Britain is the captain of a small coastal steamer of The Netherlands merchant fleet, whose leg was almost torn off when he led his crew in fighting off four Nazi bombers. The captain will be decorated with Holland's highest award by Queen Wilhelmina in person.

The bravery of this Netherlands seaman is typical of the resistance which the Hollanders still are opposing to their Nazi invaders. Even in Holland itself, the German authorities have not yet found a means to compel customers in restaurants to remain when German officers take seats on the premises. When this happens, the regular diners walk out as a silent and dignified protest. In London, Queen Wilhelmina and her ministers are busy with plans for the revivulating and economic reconstruction of Holland, because they believe firmly in the eventual defeat of Hitler and his armies.

Incidentally, the people of the Netherlands East Indies have pledged themselves to raise a "Queen Wilhelmina Fund" of five million guilders to be spent principally for military purposes. In their name Queen Wilhelmina has offered 40 Spitfires and 18 bombers of the Lockheed-Hudson type to King George.
