BOMBS FALL ON DOVER

London, Dec. 4.—Bombs were dropped in Dover by German raiders shortly after noon today, "doing some damage and causing a few casualties," an official announcement said, adding that daylight air activity over Britain as a whole was "very slight."

The announcement said one German bomber was shot down over The Netherlands coast by British fighters without losses to themselves.
