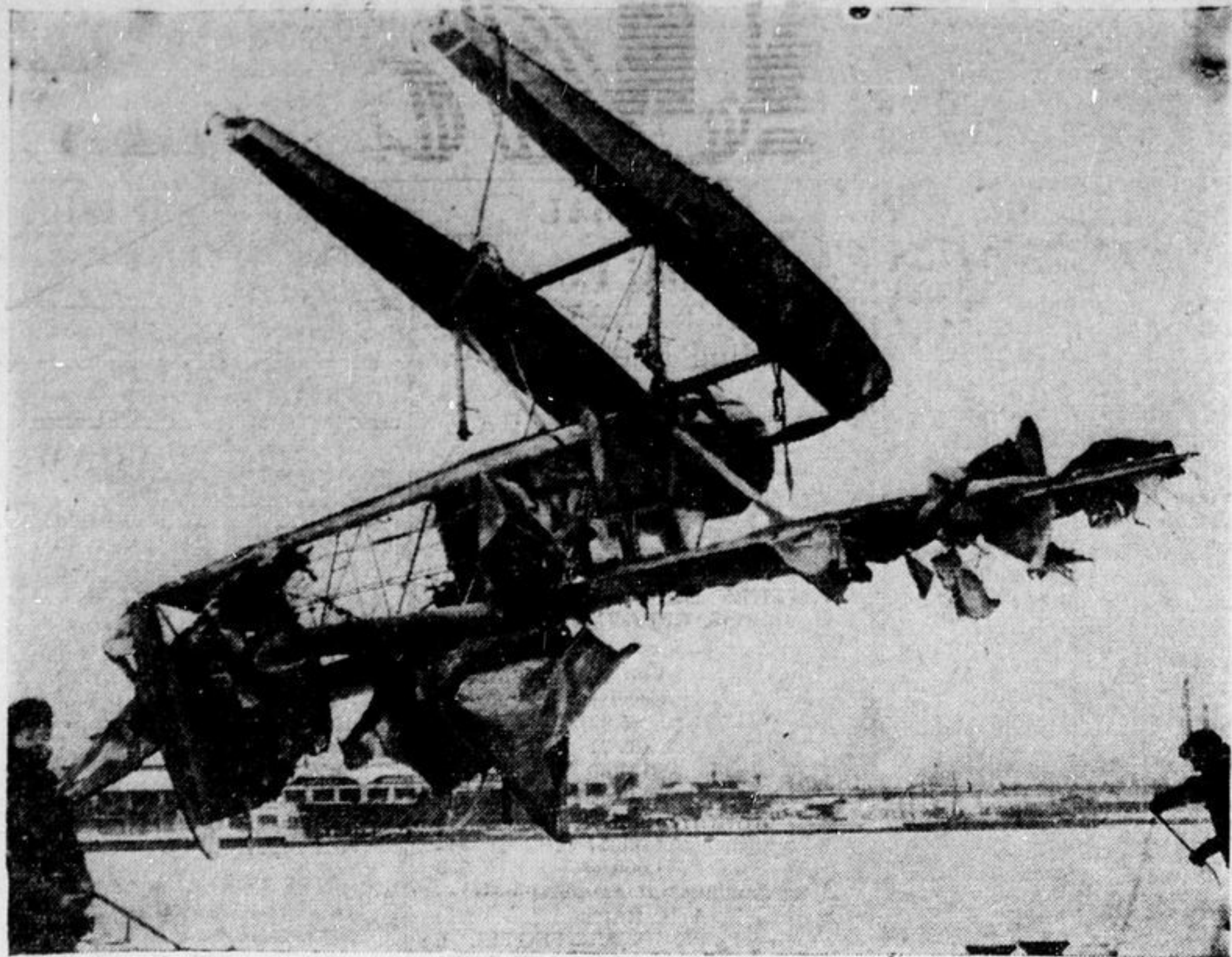


## EASY TO REPAIR

There are two reels of pictures showing the old master, Hannes Schneider, and his fellow ski instructors touring and racing in the mountains of the Austrian Tyrol, climbing through powder snow and beautiful scenery to the summits and then racing down mile-long slopes at breath-taking speed. A series of slow motion pictures show in detail technical manoeuvres such as stem turns, jump turns and various christianas.

Another feature of the gathering will be the introduction of the new executive to the members. They include, Mert Lake, president; Howard Bengry, vice-president and chalet keeper; Helen Prout, secretary; Earl Beattie, treasurer; Joe Winton, membership chairman; Vic Thompson, trails chairman; Hugh Sampson, competitions chairman; Martin McHugh, entertainment chairman, and Dave Wemyss, who is in charge of the junior section. The club will also publish a ski bulletin twice a month in order that members may keep themselves informed of the club's activities and future events.

### Woman in Kirkland Heads the Poll in Vote for Council

Dr. McBain Well in Lead in Vote for School Board.

At Kirkland Lake (Township of Teck) the head of the municipality, Reeve R. J. Carter, was re-elected by acclamation.

In the voting for councillors, Mrs. Anne Shipley headed the polls with 1603 votes. Councillor Kinniburgh was second with 1507 votes and Councillor Maguire had 1230 votes. Teck township has only four councillors and the race for fourth place was a very close one—Councillor Tommy Church only beating out former Councillor Chas. Tresidder by ten votes—the figures being Church 1210, Tresidder, 1200.

There were eight other candidates for council (thirteen in all, like Timmins this year), the other candidates including I. J. Miron who received 957 and William Ramsey (formerly of Timmins) who had 795. The candidate receiving the lowest vote was Amos Vincent who had 144.

Dr. R. W. McBain formerly of Timmins headed the poll for school trustee with 1567 votes, the next nearest being G. A. Howes with 1223 while the other elected, O. E. Andrew, had 934 votes.

There were 2228 votes against Daylight Saving, while less than half that number (1073) voted for the old new time.

The vote against a second year for council was almost two to one, 2113 voting against the 2-year term while 1128 voted in favour.

Commenting on the fact that only thirty per cent of the voters turned out to express their opinion on election day, Reeve Carter described the apparent lack of interest as "an absolute scandal".
