

South Porcupine High School Commencement Exercises Last Friday

Auditorium Filled With Students in Attractive Uniform Dress. Presentation of Graduation Diplomas, Certificates and Other Awards. "Co-operation of all Necessary to Success in Education," Says Principal Blake.

South Porcupine, Dec. 21—(Special to The Advance)—South Porcupine High School commencement exercises took place on Friday afternoon at 1:30. On the platform with Principal W. S. Blake were the clergy—Father Roberge, Archdeacon Woodall and Rev. J. A. Lyttle—and members of the High School Board—Mr. R. E. Dye, Mr. C. Kemsley and Mr. F. Laforest.

The auditorium was filled with the students—the girls looking smart in their school uniforms of yellow blouses and navy tunics, and the boys in white shirts—and several parents and friends.

Mr. Blake in his address of welcome spoke of the school: "If success is to be attained the whole-hearted co-operation of everyone is needed. Parents should know that students are giving the best of their service, and the teachers appreciate the good response." In his fifteenth year of teaching, he said, he was never so completely tired as today, for 90 per cent of the students were affected by the seriousness and tenseness of the times, and teaching was difficult. Besides this, though, there had been greater progress this year than in any previous year among the students. The teachers are asking the students to use the holidays to regain lost energy and be back for another heavy term in January. He welcomed the clergy and board as tried friends of the school—especially Father Roberge whose first appearance it was on the High School platform.

Mr. R. E. Dye congratulated the teaching staff and pupils on the progress made. He also said what constituted a real institute of learning, and which South Porcupine possessed, a good building, a good staff and attentive pupils. "We, as parents, and you as pupils need have no fear that in other parts of the province there are more educational advantages than right here in our town," he said.
