

Ankerite Tie Dome for Group Leadership

Bisons Smother McIntyre With Third Period Dash That Nets Four Tallies

Battling Ankerite Crew Come Through With Convincing 7-4 Victory After Staying on Even Terms for Two Periods. Penalty in Last Period Costly to McIntyre Two Fluke Goals Scored During Torrid Engagement.

A smashing third-period attack that netted four goals gave Buffalo Ankerite a 7-4 victory over McIntyre Monday night and sent the fast-travelling Bisons into a first place tie with Dome Porkies.

For two periods the two squads battled on even terms but the last twenty minutes saw the battling Bisons take complete command of the situation and smother the McIntyre under a barrage of ruckers.

The game itself was fast all the way and produced the type of hockey that had the large crowd out of their seats on many occasions. The checking was close and rugged but penalties were decidedly few. However it was a penalty for a minor infraction to Petrucci that paved the way for the Ankerite blitzkrieg in the last period.

Allan and Herb Carnegie gave Ankerite a two-goal advantage after eight minutes of play in the first period but a penalty to Lever late in the play gave the Mass an advantage that they turned into two goals. One of the tallies was of the fluky variety. Kemp, Ankerite goalie, catching the puck and throwing it into his own net. The other was scored in a ganging attack by Lister, with Smith and Drummond getting assists.

Starting out on even terms in the second, Baker slapped in a fluke goal to put McIntyre out in front. Petrucci was sent to the bull pen for holding and Ankerite evened things up. Jack Young batting in a pass from the two Carnegies.

The last period worked into a stampede for the Bisons after B. Young

put the Ankerite a goal ahead on a pass from Hebbie Carnegie. Then Petrucci was given a penalty for tripping and the Buffalo crew really turned on the heat. Swarming in at top speed they scored two goals in less than a minute. Morris and Ossie Carnegie bedded the marksmen. At the eleven minute mark with both teams even, Messett rifled home a pass from Lever to put the Bisons four goals ahead and clinch the verdict. With less than a minute remaining to play, Drummond scored for McIntyre on a neat play. Smith laying over a nice pass.

Instalment Plan Makes Income Tax Easier to Handle

Can Pay in Monthly Sums, Starting Not Later Than January 31st.

Because of reduced exemptions more people will be affected by the new wartime income tax than ever before. Few people have given thought to the matter of meeting the 1941 income tax and are due for a nasty jolt if they let it ride until the due date of April 30. The government made available a monthly budget plan that will reduce the shock of meeting the wartime budget demands. The Northern News notes in its issue this week.

The Minister of Finance announced payment will be accepted on an instalment basis, without the usual five per cent interest charge, provided that one-third of the total tax is paid in four monthly instalments, beginning not later than January 31, and the remaining two thirds in four equal monthly instalments beginning no later than August 31, 1941.

The new tax takes in the salaries of single men starting at \$800 per year, and running through to the very fortunate fellows who get, if there are any, \$25,000 a year. The tax is computed, in every case, before exemptions. In the lower brackets, that embraces most people, the man earning \$800 a year must budget to meet a yearly tax of three dollars on the basis of, if the budget plan is accepted, of 25 cents for the first four months starting on January 31, and 50 cents per month for the remaining four months, ending on August 31, 1941, or the taxpayer can cover the payment in eight equal instalments in every case.

The man in the \$900 bracket must contribute nine dollars, or 75 cents for the first four months and \$1.50 for the remaining four ending August 31. In the \$1,000 category the tax amounts to \$15 or \$1.25 for the first four months, and \$2.50 per month until the tax is met.

The table continues on through to the \$25,000 bracket and if it gives any consolation to those paying the tax the man earning \$5,000 per year must pay a tax of \$615; \$10,000 per year, a tax of \$2,137.50; \$20,000 a tax of \$6,202.50 and \$25,000 a tax of \$8,437.50.

Estimated That Over 3,000 Here Danced the Old Year Out

Large Attendance at Eight New Year's Eve Dances Here.

At least eight dances took place in the district on New Year's eve, and at each one, there was a large crowd. Four of the dances were in Timmins, three in Schumacher and one in South Porcupine.

In Timmins, the largest crowd gathered at the Riverside Pavilion, with an attendance of four hundred and fifty couples; the Jewish people celebrated the event with a dance at the synagogue; others attended the dance at the Hollinger Hall for the Bombed Victims' Fund, and the Finnish people gathered at the Harmony Hall.

In Schumacher, dances sponsored by the Schumacher Lions' Club and the Badminton Club brought the largest attendance, about two hundred couples attending each. The Frontiersmen's dance was attended by about one hundred and thirty-five couples, and in South Porcupine, over one hundred couples were present at the dance in the auditorium of the Arena Building.

Dayton-Porcupine Now Controlled by Detroit Interests

Board of Directors Includes Dayton Ostromer, Well-Known Timmins Man.

The annual meeting of Dayton-Porcupine Mines Ltd., held in Toronto last week re-elected the board of directors appointed earlier in the year. The board was originally appointed when Detroit and Buffalo interests reached an agreement early in 1940. Control is now vested in the Detroit group which has the greatest financial interest in the company. The Buffalo interests were the vendors of the property and the Detroit people have contended for a long time that the vendors held an unequitable proportion of the issued shares and have been desirous of purchasing sufficient shares to give them undisputed control. This has now been accomplished. On the board of seven, the Detroit group is represented by A. A. Bull, S. C. Clarke, H. M. Pryale and H. A. King. Other directors are: D. Ostromer, E. L. O'Reilly and F. Nicoll.
