"The Fargo Kid" will be at the Cartier theatre Friday and Saturday of this week, Jan. 10th and 11th.

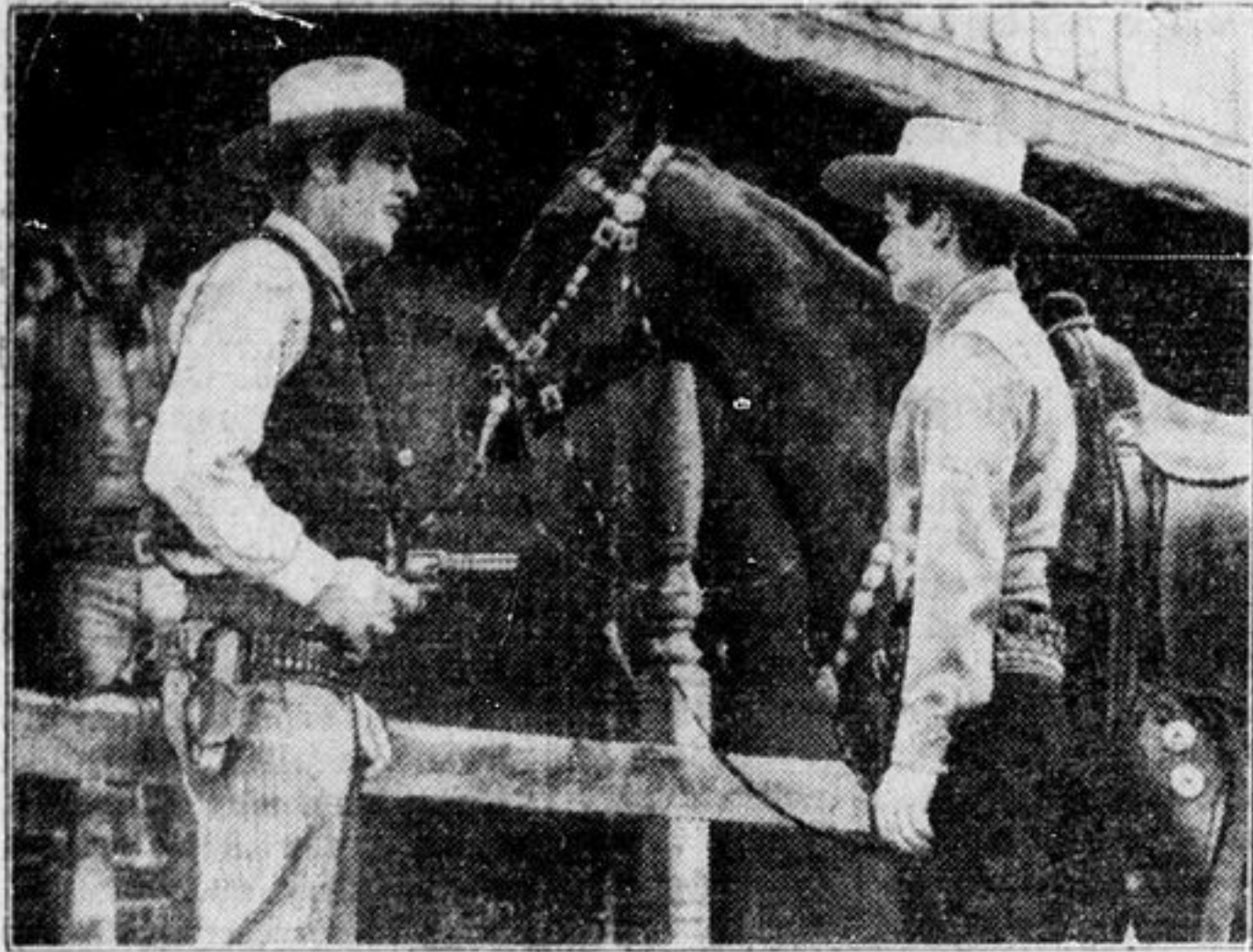
The troubles of the gold prospectors in the early days of the West are vividly revealed in this new picture, "The Fargo Kid."

### To Present Red Cross With Memorial for Mrs. Freiman

During her whole lifetime Mrs. A. J. Freiman, of Ottawa, sister of Mrs. A. J. Shrage, Timmins, devoted her outstanding talent and her unusual energy to every worthy cause. She was particularly active in war work, giving generously of her time, her talents and her money to worthy purposes in the present war, as she did in the war of 1914 to 1918. As it was among her last wishes before her recent death that all in Canada should give their all to the war, it is only fitting that any memorial to her should be a help also to the cause of the Empire and the right. There was accordingly a particular fitness in regard to the decision of the Laurentian Regional Association of the Aleph Zadik Aleph, Ottawa, to inaugurate a national campaign to purchase a war vehicle to be presented to the Red Cross, the vehicle and equipment to be dedicated to the memory of the late Mrs. A. J. Freiman. The plan is to purchase a mobile canteen for Red Cross uses and to present this gift as a fitting tribute to the truly remarkable efforts of the late Mrs. Freiman.

### Peg British Food Prices To Burn Profiteers' Fingers

London, England, Jan. 8 — Lord Woolton, Minister of Food, has announced the "pegging" of the price of foods, notably coffee, cocoa, chocolate, canned and boiled vegetables, canned pork and beans, poultry, tapioca, canned soups, processed cheese, etc. Wholesalers are forbidden to sell at prices higher than last Dec. 2nd. Britain has a temporary meat shortage. Anti-profiteering plans are designed to "burn the fingers" of the profiteers. Lord Woolton suggested. Lord Woolton also said that most of the queuing for supplies had been for unrationed items such as eggs and onions.
