Police Court

Five illegal parkers faced Magistrate Atkinson on Tuesday. Of these, four pleaded guilty and paid \$1 and costs; the fifth, however pleaded innocence. Constable testified that said car was parked outside the Central Hotel to near the travelled portion of the highway. "There was no sign of the sidewalk" accused protested. "I parked as near the snowbank as possible."
"There was no snowbank," said the officer.
"By pardon officer the snowbank is still there," said defendant. However, his worship found him guilty and he paid \$5 and costs.
T. Scott is still in hospital and once more the case against him was adjourned.
Three for having no motor license were fined \$5 and costs; and three others for neglecting to carry their registration cars paid a \$5 fine.
Only one drunk faces a charge.
A long case involving witnesses concerning I. Moreau charged with being illegally in possession of beer, being prohibited by the L.C.A. was dismissed.
