

# Dome Score Surprise Win Over Bisons 5-1

## Hollinger Defeat McIntyre In Overtime Struggle 4-3 And Lengthen Lead on Dome

**Greenshirts Score Tying Goal in Dying Seconds of Last Period After Face-Off in McIntyre Territory. "Mike" Horbel Scores Three for Hollinger.**

Scoring the tying goal with only forty one seconds remaining in play, Hollinger Greenshirts went out in overtime Friday night to beat McIntyre 5-1 in a scheduled Senior N.O.H.A. fixture. It was a McIntyre lapse with the third period just over that provided the setup for their downfall. Hollinger were pressing hard when McIntyre "iced" the puck. Play was called back for a face-off inside the blue line and as soon as the puck was dropped, "Mike" Horbel snared the rubber and batted a shot past Beare to deadlock the score at 3-3 and send the game into overtime. Had the McIntyre not "iced" the puck there is little doubt but that they would have held off the Hollinger drive and come home with a win but that's the way hockey games are won and lost.

The victory gives Hollinger a clear seven-point lead over Dome and also brings them to within two points of the second-place McIntyre.

The game itself was far from spectacular in the brand of hockey it produced and both clubs made a rather drab showing. There were spots where the action was in high gear but for the most part it could hardly be described as impressive.

"Mike" Horbel was the sniping star of the night, scoring three of the Hollinger goals, including that third-period tally that set the stage for a Hollinger victory when defeat seemed

inevitable. Cooper led the McIntyre attack with two goals, both on passes from Henry Lone.

Both teams had the advantage at one time or another in the first period but the session ended with the score tied at 2-2. Lorraine scored the first McIntyre goal on a pass from Murphy just over a minute after the game got under way. McComb, McIntyre defenceman, was penalized and before he returned to the ice, Hollinger had taken command by a 2-1 margin. Horbel got both goals. On the 18, "Bummer" Doran rifled a hard drive that Beare stopped. Horbel picked up the rebound and again Beare was in front. When Horbel got the second rebound however he made no mistakes and rapped the puck into the twine from close range. Alex Stewart, mowed down at the McIntyre defence in another attack, passed the puck to Horbel as he was going down and the chunky centre star came through again to send the Hollinger ahead 2-1. The teams were at full strength again when Cooper tied up on a nice passing play with Lone.

The second period went scoreless, despite the fact that each club had to play short-handed owing to penalties. "Ory" Smith had the nicest chance of the period to score for McIntyre but his drive hit the goal post.

Neither team showed any particular edge in the overtime until B. Wilson rapped home a pass from Alex Stewart to win the game for Hollinger. It was a nice effort and Beare had little chance to save. McIntyre stormed into the Hollinger defence but Bentley was unbeatable. With a minute to go the McIntyre goalies was taken out and six McIntyre forwards tried unsuccessfully to get the tying counter.
