Opening of New Church at S. Porcupine on Sunday

Basement Building, to be Finished Later, Now in Use for Church Services. Rev. W. M. Mustard to Preach on Sunday Morning, and Rev. F. J. Baine in the Evening.

South Porcupine, Feb. 19th, Special to The Advance.

The basement of the new United Church will be ready on Sunday for the congregation to use for divine service. Rev. Mustard, of Timmins, will take the morning service and Rev. F. J. Baine, of Schumacher, will preach in the evening.

This building—consisting at present of basement only, with temporary roof—is completely without debt, and is a credit to the indefatigable work and energy of the various bodies within the congregation which have made it possible. While it will be turned later on, when the building is finally completed into a hall for the use of the congregations various activities, at present it is an exceedingly comfortable, well lighted church, which will seat 230 people. The folding chairs placed in position today are easy to sit in, roomy and comfortable. Reversed lighting gives adequate illumination and the building is air conditioned.

Smoothly finished concrete floor has been painted so well that it gives the appearance of inlaid linoleum.

Area is 69 ft by 34 ft and the walls are finished in wallboard, and special "masonry" board.

Folding doors assure silence. Mr. P. Andrews designed the building, and with Mr. W. Honer and Mr. Burton (and others)—voluntary workers have completed the finishing of the interior.

A Gurney electric range (large) in the spacious and well appointed kitchen was the gift of Miss Margaret Fraser, in memory of her father, Dr. Fraser. Many other items and appointments in the kitchen facilities for making easy the work of putting on dinners and lunches, are installed—folding wall tables—large sink—hot water, new dishes, new silver and sliding panels for waiter service,—which will be a delight for the Ladies Guild to use.

A new oaken font with brass inset bowl is the gift of the Sunday School children for the new church.

Ample closet and cupboard space is provided, as well as a robing room for the choir.

The United Church may well be proud of its new edifice, even though it is really a basement.

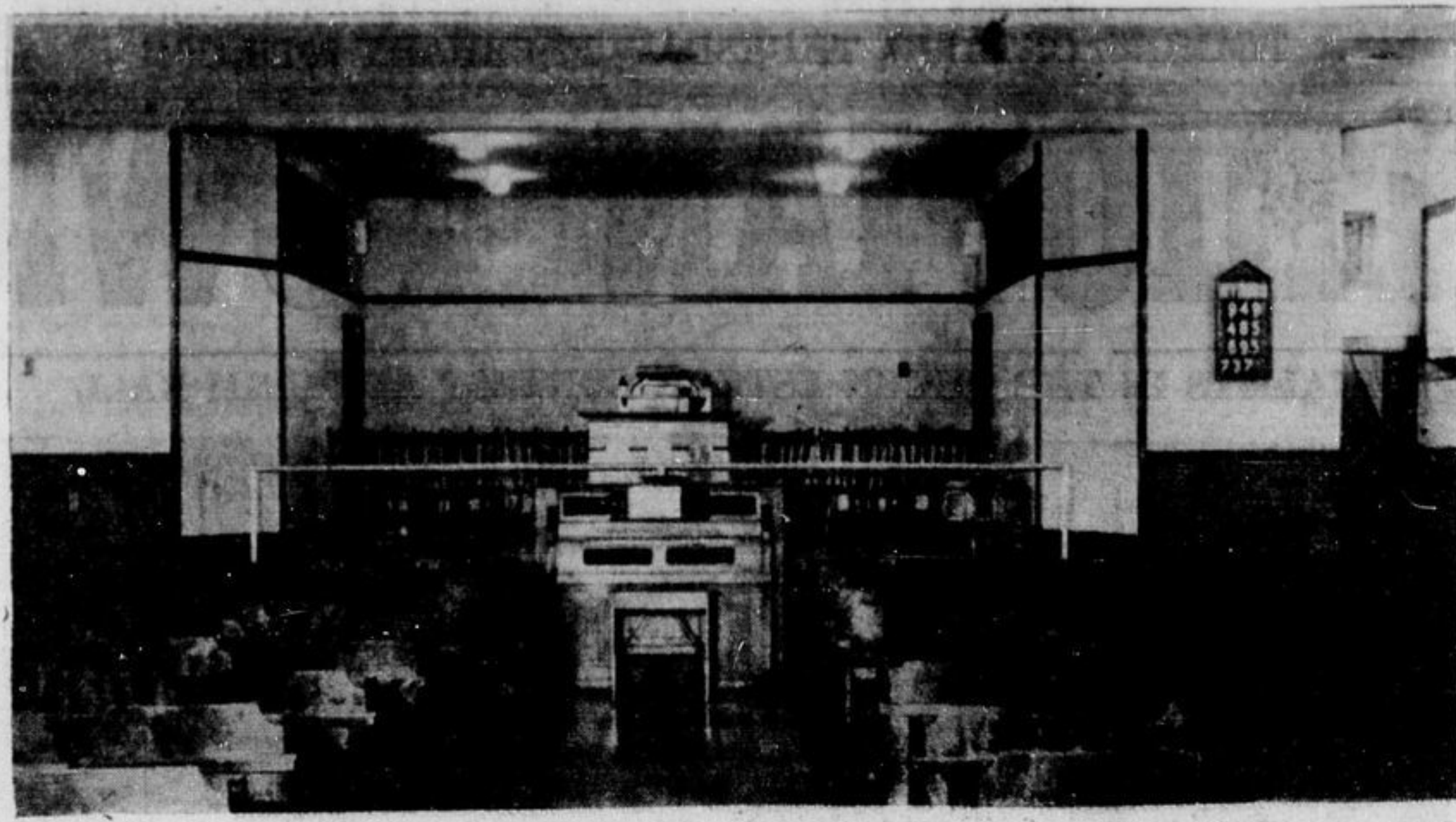
