

BISONS TAKE FIRST GAME OF FINALS

Hollinger Outclassed 7-4 As Ankerite Give Dazzling Display Before Big Crowd

Bisons Score Five Goals Before Greenhirts Reply Late in Second Period Last Night. Losers Outscore Ankerite in Last Period But Final Decision Was Never in Doubt.

Unable to match the dazzling speed and co-ordinated attack of their opponents in the first two periods, Hollinger Greenhirts were defeated by Buffalo-Ankerite in the first game of the Porcupine Senior N. O. H. A. group finals last night before a capacity crowd at McIntyre arena by a score of 7-4. Right from the start, Ankerite looked like a winner, while the Hollinger, after a tough three-game series with McIntyre in the semi-finals seemed to lack the dash that carried them in the final bracket of the playoffs. The second game will be played on Friday night.

Ankerite finished the first period with a 2-0 lead and at the end of the second they had taken 5-1 stranglehold. In the third session however,

Hollinger pounded out three goals to two by the Bisons and gave the Ankerite defenders a busy time.

In the first period when the Ankerite built up a commanding lead it was a case of just too much speed and finish. The Hollinger defence didn't look too hot on the two goals scored against them in the first period but at that Bentley kicked out several other drives that appeared to be labelled.

McArthur and Baker were the hardest working pair on the Hollinger squad. McArthur fattened his play-off average with a goal and one assist and teamed with Baker for a superb display of backchecking.

For the winners, Jack Young, Hepworth, Allan and Morris, literally burned up the ice with well-timed plays and had a lions share of the scoring honours. Morris and Allan each accounted for two goals. "Swede" Paulson also came into the limelight with a goal and an assist. The two Carnegies did a masterful defensive job and Herbie came through with a goal late in the third period to give the Bisons a win by a wider margin.

A well-executed pass by Jack Young to Hepworth, who was left unmolested during a scramble in the corner, was the set-up for the first Ankerite goal in the first period. With four minutes to go, Young slipped out another pass to Hughie Allan and the bespectacled Ankerite wingman, rifled a hard drive past Bentley. Just before the period ended, "Red" McArthur took the puck off an Ankerite defenceman's stick and Kemp had to make a brilliant save from close range.

Six minutes had not elapsed in the second when Barney Morris rapped in a rebound from a shot by Allan and almost on the next play Jack Young missed an open net on a pass from Hepworth. Baker of the Hollinger then made a dangerous sortie into Ankerite territory and gave Kemp a hot one to handle. "Ab" Kerr, Hollinger defenceman was given the first penalty of the game for tripping Hughie Allan and Ankerite uncorked a withering attack. Hughie Allan scored an unassisted goal and then Barney Morris batted in a pass from Hepworth to put the Ankerite five goals up.

Herb Carnegie was banished for tripping Bill Wilson and a few seconds later Ossie Carnegie was thumbed for tripping Lortie. This left the Ankerite two men short but the Greenhirts couldn't even score with a two-man advantage. Bill Zuke was penalized and with Hollinger swarming in Hafildson scored on a pass from McArthur. Just before the end of the period Hawkey drew another Ankerite penalty that carried over into the third period.

Greenhirts Are Victors In Last Semi-Final Game Played On Monday Night

McIntyre Come From Behind to Tie Game Up in Third Period But Alex Stewart Scores Winning Goal on Pass From "Red" McArthur to Give Hollinger 4-3 Victory. No Penalties During Game.

Hollinger Greenhirts qualified to meet Buffalo-Ankerite in the finals of the Porcupine Senior N. O. H. A. group Monday night when they edged out McIntyre Miners 4-3 in the third and deciding game of the semi-finals before a roaring crowd of more than 2,500 fans.

Hollinger beat off a high pressure attack by McIntyre that tied the game half way through the last period and a goal by Alex Stewart with less than eight minutes to go decided the contest. In the dying seconds of the game Bentley made a spectacular stop on a rush by Jack Drummond that would have beat many a goalie.

While defeated, the McIntyre actually had the edge on the night's play and it was a lucky break that Lorne Beare dropped into his own net what proved the deciding margin. While the first period went scoreless, the Macs showed superiority in territorial play and in the last frame they literally hemmed the Greenhirts into their own end of the rink. Hollinger took the lead in the second and when the period ended held a 3-1 margin but two of the goals were of the "soft" variety. When the Macs tied it up in the third it looked as if they might come through but Stewart's goal settled the argument.

Just before the second period started Alex Stewart demanded that the referees measure Beare's goal stick. The "woodwork" was found to be the proper dimensions and the battle was resumed. Hafildson started the Green-shirts down the victory path when he sank a pass from Villeneuve just after the six minute mark. It was a smart goal and a just reward for the hard-working Hollinger pair. McIntyre came right back into the fight three minutes later when Teddy Lister scored on a well-timed pass from Jack Drummond. Lister blazed the puck past Bentley from ten feet and the Hollinger goalie had little chance to save.

"Hummer" Doran after taking a pass from McArthur at his own blue line, ripped through the McIntyre defence and just before he passed the goal post, slid a slow shot across that just caught the off corner by an eyelash. The puck never left the ice. Less than a minute later Horbel scored another lucky marker, when he shot after taking Doran's pass. Beare had no trouble catching the puck but before he could toss it clear the rubber dropped out of his glove and rolled leisurely into the cage, just inside the post.

As the third session got under way McIntyre backed the Hollinger against the wall and camped inside the blue line for minutes at a time. After several close calls, Jimmy Colquhoun snared the puck from Horbel who came out in front of his own net, and ripped a driving shot into the twine. Bentley's view was partly screened by the milling players but from the short distance it would have been a hard drive to stop under any conditions. Two minutes later McIntyre tied the game up when Somers drove home a two-way pass from Holouka and

Cooper on a McIntyre ganging attack. With the McIntyre travelling at top speed and the Hollinger more or less back on their heels, it appeared as if the Macs might pull out with a last minute win but the tables were turned when Alex Stewart, who seemed to lack his usual fire, picked up a pass from "Red" McArthur and drove a hard shot past Beare, who was at his mercy. The big crowd of Hollinger supporters went wild as the Green-shirts once more took the lead. There was just over seven and a half minutes to play and McIntyre again stormed the Hollinger citadel. With three minutes to go, Jimmy Colquhoun had an open net in front of him, but shot three feet wide of the net. Just before the game ended, Jack Drummond gave the Hollinger fans a shock when he rounded the defence and had only Bentley to beat. The Hollinger goalie came out of his net to make a remarkable stop.

The game was one of the cleanest seen here in years and not a single penalty was handed out. Both sides dished out plenty of bodychecks but not a single temper flared during the whole engagement.
