New Lemp Film, "Four Mothers" Promises to be Popular.

One of the happiest events for theatre goers is the filming of "Four Mothers," the latest of the Lemp family film series. "Four Mothers" will be shown at the Palace theatre on Friday, Friday midnight and Saturday of this week, March 28th and 29th. As in the earlier stories, "Four Daughters" and "Four Wives," the cast is headed by Priscilla, Rosemary and Lola Lane, Gale Page, Jeffrey Lynn, Eddie Albert, Claude Rams, May Robson, Frank McHugh and Dick Foran.

In "Four Mothers," however, there are some cast additions, for the Lemp family has been growing. Lola is the mother of twin girls, portrayed in the film by Barbara Ann and Arlene Lane; Priscilla's baby girl is played by Beverly Quintanilla, who made her debut as a baby boy in Eddie Cantor's "Forty Little Mothers"; Gale Page's little daughter is played by Sharon Van.

The new story, written by Stephen Morehouse Avery, and suggested by Fannie Hurst's book "Sister Act," takes the Lemp family through a family crisis that combines drama, pathos and humor in pretty much the same proportion that they occur in most families. For fun and humor, there are the babies, four one-year-olds; for drama, there is the financial crisis when the Florida real estate development into which the whole family has

put their money, fails; for pathos, there is the loss of Father Lemp's job at the Music Foundation, but this is more than made up for when he is invited to conduct the Beethoven festival in Chicago.

To those who have followed the series, this newest adventure will come as a delightful treat, but newcomers to the Lemp family stories will also find "Four Mothers" a complete new story that stands on its own. William Keighley directed the film production.

Great Walt Disney Festival Now at the Cartier Theatre

Famous Productions Enhanced by Their Music.

A combination of Walt Disney's magic and the genius of three of the world's most famous fairy tale writers is in store for those who attend the Great Walt Disney Festival at the Cartier theatre Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week, March 27th, 28th and 29th.

Topping the bill is "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," the first full-length animated feature in Technicolor produced by Walt Disney, which when it opened in New York at Radio City Music Hall, ran for five weeks to capacity crowds. The original story—and who as a child hasn't heard it time and again—was adapted for the Disney medium from the Grimm fairy tale.

Kirkland Police Raid Twenty Homes in Lake Shore Town

Alleged Subversive Literature Seized.

Kirkland Lake, March 26—In the largest massed raid ever attempted by police in this district, Teek Township and Provincial Police officers raided 20 homes in Kirkland Lake and King Kirkland over the week-end, seizing alleged subversive Jehovah's Witnesses literature and placing two persons under arrest for infraction of Section 39-A of the Defence of Canada Regulations.

Both police bodies co-ordinated their raids, which produced a considerable amount of material at practically every home visited during the evening. The two persons who were taken into custody were later released on \$200 cash bail each.

Full details of the raids have been withheld by police until they receive instructions from the Attorney-General's office to proceed with the prosecution. Attorney Dalton Dean of Haileybury, in consultation with the Toronto office and will likely have an announcement to make in Thursday's police court. In such cases, authorization for commitment must be given by the Attorney-General's office before local authorities can proceed with the court case.

Teek Township Police staged their massed raid on 16 homes in Kirkland Lake proper, Federal Townsite and Chaput-Hughes, while Provincial officers visited four homes in King Kirkland.

Wood Has Large Number of Little Known Uses

Apart from their importance as a source of raw material for the lumber and pulp and paper industries, Canada's forests yield a widening range of products derived in whole or in part from wood in which this material is not apparent. According to the Forest Products Laboratories of the Department of Mines and Resources, the largest group of such articles is derived from wood pulp. The modern package of cigarettes is a striking example. In getting cigarettes from the factory to the consumer no less than seven different grades of wood pulp are used in the making of cartons, adhesive paper, packages, transparent wraps, tissues, excise stamps, and cigarette papers.

Rayon is a well-known derivative of wood pulp, but at one stage in their creation rayon stockings, ties or drapes might equally well have become movie film, artificial leather, cordite, or the glossy finish on an automobile.

Wood is an important, though rarely noticed, element in automobile batteries, and is also an ingredient of many coverings, explosives, and plastic products such as electric switch buttons, radio cabinets, and all sorts of novelties. It also provides a number of medicinal products and is likely to become an increasingly important contributor to man's diet through the production of sugar and possibly other substances. Already wood is a valuable source of vanilla flavouring.

Haileybury Student Dies on His Way to High School

Immediately after crossing Latchford street at Haileybury on Monday morning on his way to the Haileybury high school on his way to his usual classes, William Edward Thuerck, 16-year-old student, collapsed as he entered the high school grounds and died before medical help arrived. Organize Unit to Serve the North Against Raids

Kirkland Lake, March 26—The men who know the North's forests, rivers and barren wastes, as well as the city man knows the neighbourhood block—the guides, bushmen, prospectors and trappers—are being organized here by Colin Clarke, under the sponsorship of the Canadian Corps Association, to assist in defence of Canada.

They are being organized against the possibility of an enemy attempting an invasion of Canada from the north. These men admit the possibility of an enemy landing in force in Canada is remote, but they believe the vast reaches of the Hudson bay area could provide shelter for a plane that could carry out raids on Canadian industrial sites.

The organization will cover a territory reaching from Englehart to Matheson and from the Montreal river to the Quebec border, roughly an area of 10,000 square miles, and will co-operate with the Ontario Forestry Branch. Those who seek enrollment must furnish experience data and a list of available equipment, motor cars, trailers, boats, motors, canoes, any material to expedite travel.

The corps will be loosely organized to allow freedom of action of its members located over a wide area, yet at the same time provide an effective force should an occasion for its use arise.

While in the bush on prospecting, fishing, trapping or guiding trips, members will be on the lookout for suspicious clearings that could be utilized as landing and refuelling bases. Particular attention is to be given to all inland lakes with good shorelines. The members will watch for caches of plane fuel, condition that might give rise to serious fires and will be on the watch to apprehend escaped enemy prisoners should they penetrate the bush country.
