

ANKERITE TRIMS KERR-ADDISON 10-5

Power Stages Come-Back to Win the Championship of the Commercial Loop

Wipe Out a Deficit of 88 pins and Pile Up a Margin of 215. Score a Thirty-Two Hundred Total With Handicap. Salomaa Leads Pack.

The championship of the Commercial Bowling League was decided on Tuesday night when the Power, still smarting from their defeat of the night before, lashed out and wiped out the deficit in the first game and then kept going to add a considerable amount in the second game. The game originally supposed to be played next Monday was brought forward to get the thing settled before Easter.

Gambles had gone into the second set of games with an 88 point lead but a slow start in the first game against a hot Power team put them behind the eight ball. In the six play-off games Gambles turned in some of the worst bowling that they have done this year but that didn't take any credit away from the Power team because they turned in some of the year's best scores in the past week.

Bert McQuarrie paced the Power to their first win with a score of 250. Following right behind him was Mike Bernardine with 225 and Towers with 205. Pete Nicolson was the only man on the Gambles team to break the two hundred mark. He scored a 214 count as Gambles slid under by a hundred and sixty pins. At the end of the first game Gambles, who had gone into the game with a lead of 88 pins, were down 72.

Gambles went all to pieces in the second game and not a man got over the charmed two hundred. Power had two men over the lump and two more that just missed it. Ero Salomaa led the electricians with a count of 298 and Bernardine had a 217 score.

Gambles came back to win the last game but the margin was not big enough to win the title for them. Four Gambles men got over the two hundred mark. Johnny Moss had a nice game of 262, Pete Nicolson had a 244 count, Lambert had 204 and Jack Tait scored 201. Bert McQuarrie scored a 234 and Salomaa cracked out a 207 count.

Power had a lead in the last three games of 303 pins, enough to win the title by 215 pins.

Ankerite and Kerr-Addison Play to 5-5 Tie Monday at Kirkland in Exhibition

Intermediate Kerr-Addison Club Holds Powerful Ontario Senior Finalists to Tie in First of Two Exhibition Games

Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons ran into a bit of trouble when they accepted the challenge that was hurled by the Kerr-Addison Greenhirts of Kirkland Lake. They took the trip down expecting that the intermediate team would be a pushover but they were startled when the little team held them to a 5-5 tie. Five times the boys from Kirkland came from behind to tie the count. The Bisons could never get farther than one goal ahead.

The game produced a lot of wide open puck chasing by both clubs. Goaltenders on both sides were left unprotected time and again throughout the game.

Kirkland Lake, April 9.—As it panned out, the tilt was one of Buffalo-Ankerite taking the lead and Kerr-Addison evening the count. The Bisons never had more than a one-goal lead at any time in the game, although they led going into the second and third periods by that small margin. The greenhirts always came back with dangerous three-man rushes to knot the count and make the Bisons elect a wide-open offensive.

Long after other games are gone and forgotten, local fans will continue to argue whether or not the two Kerr-Addison goals which were disallowed were scored. In the first period one by Red Croteau on a pass from Joe Tehir was ruled out, and then in the third the officials called back another Croteau marker on a play with Army Armstrong. There are those who claim that Croteau's first effort did

enter the goal through the accepted route, and are convinced that the score should show a Greenshirt victory by the one-goal margin.

The first period produced a lazy brand of hockey. Neither club was overly-exerted during the 20-minute session, and the Greenshirts gave vivid evidence of suffering from a case of stage-fright. But they appeared to like the idea of mixing it up with senior company in the second period and some of the best hockey of the game was produced in this stanza.

The visiting line that created the biggest impression with local fans was the threesome of Ossie and Herbie Carnegie and Swede Paulsen—"The Lightning Line." There is a saying that lightning never strikes twice in the same place but those three boys had a hand in three of the five Bison goals as they continually ghosted in the vicinity of the Greenshirt net. Lorne Beare, filling in between the pipes for Dave Kemp, was another who gave an impressive showing. Beare was on his game, and travelled away out of his net several times to break up dangerous plays.

Ken Davie was Tops. In this writer's opinion the hardest working Kerr-Add player on the ice was Ken Davie. The Malartic product did a real job of fore-checking against the fast Bisons and was instrumental in breaking up many plays before they got past the Buffalo-Ankerite blue line. In the last two periods Dick Roche and Red Croteau showed their old form after a rather bad start.

Kenny Davis, drafted from the Kirkland Prospectors to fill in, was another stand-out during the game. Davis weathered the Bison power plays like a veteran and was miraculous on some of his stops. In the first period he blocked quick shots by Jack Hepworth and Hughie Allan, and again in the second Davis failed to move as Hepworth broke into the clear, and stopped a hard shot with his pad. Alex Duff, playing coach of Prospectors, was also in the line-up.

The hardest body-check was an unavoidable crash between Hugh Allan and Vince Chisnell at the Kerr-Addison blue line late in the third period. Both players dropped to the ice after meeting head-on as Allan was going goalwards and Chisnell was coming out to the blue line. You could hear the thud all over the arena. Ossie Carnegie Leads With Three Goals As Herd Doubles Score

Fighting Breaks Out in the Last Period and Both Teams Play Two Men Short for Five Minutes. Greenshirt Goalie Sensational in First Period. Crowd Small.

Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons, striking their old stride again, doubled the score on the Kerr-Addison Greenhirts at McIntyre Arena last night as they trounced them ten to five in the second of their two-game exhibition series before a handful of fans. The teams tied five all at Kirkland Lake on Monday night in the first game.

Kerr-Addison Greenhirts, a team with intermediate rating, were just about all the Bisons could handle for the first two periods but the herd went on a stampede in the last, canto and came out on top with flying colours. It took the Bisons a period and a half to figure out Davis in the Greenshirts nets but when they started to get at him they kept a continual fire that brought results in form of goals. In the first twenty-nine minutes of play the Bisons scored but once and then they scored nine goals in the last thirty-one minutes.

Bisons led one to nothing at the end of the initial frame and then stretched the score to 5-3 at the end of the second. They outscored the Kirkland team five to two in the last period to lead by five goals. The snappy Kirkland Lake team can lay a lot of the blame for not being closer in the scoring at the feet of stubby Lorne Beare, McIntyre goalie who was between the pipes for the Bisons. He stopped many a drive that was ear-marked for a score.

Big Ossie Carnegie led the Bisons to their victory with three markers. Even Jackie Young got a goal. Nicolson on the ice was the Ankerite "Sunshine" line of the Carnegie brothers and "Swede" Paulsen. Lorne Beare in the Bison nets was the second choice.

Kerr-Addison's first line of Roach, Duff and Croteau stood out for the Greenshirts while Davis in goal looked unbeatable in the first two periods. Lou Lavallee, who played with Ankerite a couple of years ago, played a nice steady game and got one of the Kirkland goals.

Kerr-Addison had very few chances in the first period and whenever they did happen to break in Beare was equal to the occasion. Duff, in particular, was robbed of two or three really good chances in the first period. Patton missed a nice chance about half-way through the period when he got right in close and let the rubber get away from him.

It was big Ossie Carnegie who finally opened the game. Striking down the right side he snagged Paulsen's pass at the blue line and drilled one of those shots that made him one of the most feared men on the ice this winter. The puck screamed in under Davis' right arm.

Inside of two minutes of the second period the Kirkland team had tied the score. On a nice passing play between Davie and Christie, the former scored when he hoisted the rubber into the top corner of the net from close in.

Patton sent the Bisons back into the lead about seven minutes later when he slapped in a short pass from Roy Hawkey. It was one of those bull plays where the puck was more or less forced into the net by brute strength.

Bisons started to go ahead fast after that goal as they grabbed off two goals in less than half a minute. Morris moved in on a passing attack with Jack Young and sent the Bisons two ahead. Twenty seconds later, just as the lines were changed, the "Sunshine" boys, Ossie and Herbie, paired up to send the herd into a three goal lead that looked mighty big at that stage of the game. Ossie drilled his second sizzling drive past Davis after taking a nice pass from brother Herbie.

As the Greenshirts opened up and started to gang in on Beare, Croteau, who showed some of the nicest stick-handling of the night, sent the Greenshirts within striking distance as he sneaked in close and slid the rubber into the corner.

On an Ankerite rush, Morris sent the herd ahead again when he took a lightning pass from Allen and hoisted it in to make the count five to two. Roach and Hawkey started to give each other the butt end of the stick and they were sent to the cooler for two minutes. While they were off Duff and Croteau sneaked through a

loose Bison defence and tested Beare. Duff had the first shot and Beare handled it nicely. Croteau then had a couple of shots and when Beare stopped the first one he had to fall to the ice for it. When he fell the puck got loose and Croteau simply hoisted the rubber over Beare's body.

Near the end of the period Jack Hepworth and Tichir fell to the ice as they got all tangled up. As they got to their feet Hepworth skated off the ice and went to the dressing room. He had cut the back of his head on Tichir's skate.

Lou Lavallee brought the Greenshirts within one goal of the Bisons right at the start of the last period, drilling a shot from near the penalty line after taking a pass from Christie. The goal was scored in the first half minute of play.

"Swede" Paulsen took a neat pass from Herbie Carnegie four minutes later to send the Bisons away again. He caught the top corner of the net as he drilled the shot from close range.

The Greenshirts really opened up after that goal and they swarmed around the Ankerite nets like a bunch of bees. Everybody had a shot at Beare and one shot from Croteau almost scored. The referees thought that it was in as well as Beare. It was a back-hand shot and after the shot Beare fell around behind him in the net for the puck but it had just sneaked past the outside corner.

Micho started down on a rush that produced results. When he came within range he drilled the rubber but Beare stopped it, but let the puck get away from him. Micho then took another shot and it was good.

Shortly after that goal, Micho and Herbie Carnegie started to rough things up by the boards in the Kirkland end of the ice and faster than it takes time to tell it all the players started to gather round and throw punches at all and sundry. Roy Hawkey even streaked the length of the ice to get into the scrap. When the smoke had cleared and all the boys had their own sticks back again, Referees Frawley and Spring handed out four penalties, all majors. Herbie and Ossie Carnegie went off with Micho and Croteau of the Greenshirts.

The game then settled down to hockey with three men on each side for five minutes and taking the players off the ice seemed to be in Ankerite's favour. In any event they got two goals before the teams were at full strength again. Hepworth and Jack Young raced away after trapping two Greenshirts in the Ankerite end of the ice and Hepworth passed to Young who immediately passed back and Hepworth drilled it.

A minute later Hughie Allen raced in and drilled one when there was nobody left at the Kirkland defence to stop him.

Just as the teams came back to full strength Ossie Carnegie snared one of Herbie's passes and raced in to beat Davis for his third goal.

A couple of minutes later Jack Young and Hepworth tore down together. Hepworth got tied up in the corner so he passed to Young, who was right at the crease, and Jackie drilled in the first goal he got since his trip to Toronto to finish the scoring for the night.
