

Another T. P. A. A. Boxing Card On Wednesday Night

Gambles and Advance Take Lead In Commercial Loop Cup Play-offs on Thursday

Each Take Two Points. Four Men Soar Over the Seven Hundred Mark. Meet Each Team Once This Year.

Play started on Friday night in the Commercial Loop Cup series at the Empire Bowling Alley. It was decided that because of the lateness of the season that the series would be out to meeting each team once and have the two top teams play off for the cup.

Eight men got over the six hundred mark with four of them over the seven hundred. Salomaa led the parade with 778, Lambert got 744, Wallingford rolled 728, and Nicolson scored a 716 count. The six hundred men were Fleming with 625, McHugh with 615, Hornby 613 and McQuarrie 609.

High team total was turned in by the Power who only managed to take one point. Gambles' total was right behind them by thirty-nine pins. The Advance and T. & N. O. totals were both below the three thousand mark.

A real battle developed on the first two alleys between Gambles and Power. Gambles won two points and the Power had to be content with the one. Gambles took the first game behind the good bowling of their top three men. Lambert snapped out a 248 score. Jack Tait followed with 23 and Charlie Alton got a 211 count to give the game to Gambles. For the Power Salomaa bowled 272 and McQuarrie tossed in a 227 score that was short. Gambles won the tilt by 83 pins.

Gambles kept up their winning streak in the second game before the electricians could get their sights trained. Nicolson's 250 and Lambert's 277 was a big factor in Gambles getting over the thousand mark for the game. McHugh had 247 for the Power and Bernardine had a 211 count that left the Power 66 pins short.

The Power really turned on the heat in the last game when they rolled a total of 1230. Their total was the second highest this year, being topped only by the total that the Advance rolled against them in the play-offs. The Advance's total was 1247. Salomaa took the biggest piece of the game with a score of 349. Teddy Towers had an even hundred less. McHugh had 234 and McQuarrie had a score of 213. Gambles were almost two hundred behind with a total a little over the thousand. Pete Nicolson led them with 276 and Lambert got a score of 219, while

the rest of the team was below the two hundred mark. Power took the game by 198 pins.

The Advance was able to take two points from the T. & N. O. on the other alleys in spite of the fact that one of their men, Henry Giallonardo, is in Toronto bowling in the C.B.A. tournament. The newspapermen stepped out and rolled an eleven hundred game in the first. Led by Wallingford with 272, and Guidice with 267 they managed to beat T. & N. O. by two hundred and twenty-nine pins. Dunn got 221 and Hornby got a 205 game in the first contest. Mousseau with 262 was the only man on the railroads who got over the lump.

T. & N. O. got the second one when Fleming got 216 and Leach an even two hundred to help the team get a 929 total. The Advance had two men over two hundred but the other three were away down. Wallingford had a 212 count and Hornby had 203. T. & N. O. won the game by 88 pins.

The last session between the two teams was a real close affair till the last frame when the Advance stepped out. Wallingford led again with 254 and Hornby got 204. Fleming had 224 for the T. & N. O. and was the only man over. The Advance won the game by 72 pins.

The teams now go into their second set of games next Friday when Power meets T. & N. O. and the Advance clash with Gambles.

First Game to be Played in Toronto Tonight. Montreal Gets Second Game.

Winnipeg Rangers won the right to meet the Montreal Royals in the Memorial Cup play-offs, that are scheduled to start in Toronto tonight, by taking the seventh and deciding game from the Saskatoon Quakers in Winnipeg on Friday night. The score was 7-2.

Rangers had gained an edge in games on Winnipeg ice, winning the first and third games 6-4 and 2-1 and losing the second 4-1. The next three games on Saskatoon ice resulted in the Quakers taking two out of three to send the series to the limit. Quakers won 10-5 and then lost 4-3 and sent the series to seven games with a 10-2 win last Wednesday.

Winnipeg left on Saturday night after the game for Toronto for the first game in the best of five series for the Memorial Cup. The series moves to Montreal for the second game on Wednesday night and then returns to Toronto for the rest of the games. The third game of the series will be played on Saturday afternoon and if any more games are needed they will be played next Monday and Wednesday.

Hank Greenberg is Eligible for Draft

Detroit's Big Outfielder is Placed in I-A Classification. May be Called in May.

Hank Greenberg, big outfielder of Detroit Tigers and the American Baseball League's most valuable player in 1940, today was placed in a I-A classification, subject to immediate military service by a Detroit selective service board.

Draft board officials said that the next group to be called to service from Greenberg's district was scheduled for induction early in May, and that unless Greenberg appealed his case he would be taken into the army at that time.

Greenberg's contract for playing for the Tigers this season has been reported to call for \$50,000.

He received the usual ovation from an opening day crowd of 40,000 at Briggs Stadium Friday as he came to bat in the second inning of a game with the Cleveland Indians. He drove a long fly to the centrefield fence.

Billy Conn Wants to Meet Louis in June but Jacobs says July

The maddest guy in the fistie world today is Billy Conn—and because he figures the heavyweight title is right within his grasp and yet no word from Promoter Mike Jacobs that his fight with Joe Louis is "on."

Jacobs had said the scrap would be held in June but now, for reasons best known to himself, he wants it postponed to July.

Which rubbed the fur the wrong way on both Conn and his manager, Johnny Ray. Johnny says June would be the better month from the financial angle. Conn would be at his peak then and might suffer from the month's layover if the fight is postponed.

"Wouldn't you be sore?" asked Conn pointing out the retired undefeated at light-heavyweight champion, and has not been beaten in the heavyweight division.

"This fight is all I've lived for, all I've ever wanted."

Many sport experts think the slim 175-pound dancing master of the ring would be mismatched against the 200-pound heavyweight champion, but Conn is among the group contending that a good man weighing 175 can take on anyone, no matter how big.

Lots of action is promised at the T. P. A. A. boxing card to be presented at the "K" Club hall on Fourth avenue on Wednesday night. Ten bouts will make up the card. An opponent for Matt Daceau to replace Victor Kostrom who was killed at the Paymaster Mine yesterday, has not been decided yet.

In the curtain-raiser that gets under way about eight o'clock, Allen Menard and Clarence Kelly, two 75 lb. boys will be tossed into the ring. Cecil Sinclair and Lorenzo Prault, each 65 lbs. will follow in the second bout. The third bout will feature Neely Thrasher and Donald McPhail at eighty pounds. Murdoch McPhail and Bob Gauthier will battle in the fourth bout. The fifth bout will be made up of Alphonse Menard and Gaston Garant at 105 lbs. Another bout in the 105 lb. class will be between Kid Lachapelle and George Hamslow. Bob O'Donnell, representing the Schumacher club, and Jack Fleming carrying the Timmins colours will tangle in what promises to be a real thriller in the seventh bout. Both boys weigh in at 118 lbs. This bout will be a five-round affair.

Lester Cudmore and Mike Koval each 147 lbs. will put on a show in the next bout which also promises to go the limit, five rounds. Both boys are smart fighters and this bout should be a real crowd-pleaser. In the semi-final Alcide Theriault and Johnny Pineault will trade leather in a five-round bout. Judgment Reserved in Town of Timmins Case

Toronto, April 19—Appellate Court reserved judgments Wednesday in the appeal of the town of Timmins against a decision of Judge R. A. Dennis, of Cochrane, who found that Pamour Porcupine Gold Mines, Limited, was not liable for collection of town poll tax levied on the firm's employees.

Judge Dennis found that the town could not require this to be done by a company whose head office was outside its limits.

Argument at the appeal hearing turned on the question of whether the legislation under which the poll tax is levied had reference to a company only within the municipality imposing the tax or a company irrespective of where located.
