Twelve More Men Left Friday to Join Active Army

Total of Twenty-Two Sent Down This Week. Eight Men Are Sent to Montreal

Twelve more men left Timmins for various parts of the Army on Friday of last week. Seven of the men were from Timmins, three from Iroquois Falls, one from South Porcupine and one from Schumacher. Eight of the men went to No. 4 Army Field Work Shop at Montreal. The Army Field Work Shop is operated under the Royal Canadian Ordnance Corps.

The following four men left Timmins on Friday night's train for Military District No. 2 headquarters in Toronto: William Laird Boyd, Timmins; Carl Fisher, Timmins; Remi Larose, Timmins; Ovid Gilbert Lachapelle, Timmins. They will be placed in the Canadian Active Army in any branch that they want.

There was another medical board held this morning at the armories and there will be another one held on Thursday morning of this week. It is the practice now at the armories to hold medical boards every Monday and Thursday morning at ten o'clock to examine recruits. Open recruiting is still in progress at the armories and an average of about twenty men a week are leaving Timmins to join different units in the army.

Lt. G. G. Countryman intimated Saturday morning that recruiting will start to bring "D" Coy Algonquin Second Battalion, up to strength. "D" Coy will be going to camp again in August of this year and it is the intention of the officers to have the company at full strength and well-trained.

Stars of Picture at the Cartier Lauded in the U.S. Senate

Special Appeal in the Film "I Married Adventure."

"Martin and Osa Johnson together endured and enjoyed dangers and hardships." Senator Arthur Capper, of Kansas, declared in the Senate of the United States on May 18th, 1933. "They gathered for us and for future generations to see, hear, and ponder over the primitive life of the race—a primitive life fast passing—and the manners and habits of the great beasts of the forest, the desert, the jungle, succumbing to the march of a civilization which is destroying these things and which it seems at times threatens also to destroy itself."

Senator Capper's eloquent words, printed in the Congressional Record, have particular interest at this time, as the picture, "I Married Adventure" is at the Cartier theatre this week until Wednesday, April 28th, 29th and 30th. The life story of amazing Johnsons is one of the greatest love stories of all time. It was spun in a glow of romance from the daring experiences of a man and woman whose lives were inseparably linked by that sacred phrase in the marriage covenant—"until death do us part." For twenty-seven years the daughter of a railroad engineer followed the son of a small-town merchant along a danger trail that eventually led to fame. But fame was merely a by-product. Accomplishment was the thing they sought—a photographic record for posterity of the world's vanishing wild life. With each new expedition they rose higher in world esteem, weaving a ladder of fame all their own from the jungle tangles.

Constant Danger "I Married Adventure" illustrates what Senator Capper meant when he said: "Martin Johnson had two constant companions; his wife, Osa, and danger. But neither he nor Osa, they have told me, ever shot an animal un-

less to save human life or to obtain urgently-needed food. They did their work with their cameras. Martin Johnson was sentimental—he gently caressed—about the creatures of the forest. He pictured life, but did not destroy it.

"He could be primitive in dealing with the primitive; but he was decidedly modern, even sophisticated, in accomplishing the tasks he set for himself. In their early days, he and Osa tramped from 20 to 30 miles a day over all kinds of terrain, joyously enduring almost unbelievable hardships, to obtain their photographic "specimens." But he was quick to move on to more and more rapid transportation as man progressed in his conquest of time and space, and as funds permitted. He used men in the safari; he used camels; he used the waterways of the wilderness. He was the first to adapt the motorcar to jungle travel. He and Osa became pilots, and used the airplane despite the great hazards of flying over crackles and fuelless jungles."

"He was a worthy successor of Leif Ericsson, Christopher Columbus and Sir Francis Drake. Accompanied by his devoted wife, Osa, a kindred spirit, he spent his life searching the remaining unknown parts of the earth. He pitied his strength, skill and determination against the strength of Nature."
