Says That United States Can Meet the Demand for More Oil

Able to Fill Requirements of Empire and Allies.

The United States oil industry will be able to meet her own military requirements plus those of the British Empire and her allies without jeopardizing American industrial and civilian needs or putting any undue load on the American oil industry. That is the opinion of E. DeGoyler of Dallas, Texas, whose address to the National Petroleum Association at Cleveland is contained in the current issue of the Oil and Gas Journal.

The American petroleum industry this year may be faced with a maximum increase in average demand of 20 per cent, and Mr. DeGoyler contends that the industry is able to meet this demand with ease. What future requirements may be is less definite but it is possible that demand may increase in an upward spiral, he stated, adding that it is not difficult to see future annual requirements at the rate of 200,000,000 barrels of aviation fuel alone.


