TOWN of TIMMINS By-Law No. 752

Drug Stores. WHEREAS an application has been presented to the Council praying for the passing of a By-aw requiring the closing of Drug Stores situated

Being a By-Law to provide for the early closing of

within the Municipality as therein stated. AND WHEREAS the Assessor of the Corporation reported to the Council in accordance with the provisions of By-law No. 503.

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation is satisfied that the said application has been signed by not less than three-fourths in number of the occupiers of Drug Stores within the Municipality.

NOW THEREFORE be it enacted as a By-law of the Town of Timmins as follows:

1. Except during the week immediately preceding Christmas throughout the whole of the year, on every day of the week except Saturday, the payday of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Limited and a day immediately preceding a legal holiday as defined by the Interpretation Act or a holiday proclaimed by the Mayor or the Council of the Town of Timmins, all Drug Stores within the Municipality shall be closed at the hour of 9.30 o'clock in the afternoon and shall remain closed until 5 o'clock in the forenoon of the next following day,

2. Except during the week immediately preceding Christmas throughout the whole of the year, on the payday of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Limited, Saturday and on a day preceding a legal holiday as defined by the Interpretation Act or a heliday proclaimed by the Mayor or Council of the Town of Timmins all Drug Stores within the Municipality shall be closed at the hour of 11.30 o'clock in the afternoon and shall remain closed until 5 o'clock in the forenoon of the next following

3. On each day of the week immediately preceding Christmas all Drug Stores within the Municipality shall be closed at the hour of 1130 o'clock in the afternoon and shall remain closed until 5 o'clock in the forenoon of the next following day.

4. This By-law shall be published in the issue of The Porcupine Advance newspaper published in the Town of Timmins on the 15th day of May, 1941, and shall take effect on the 26th day of May, 1941.

5. Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this By-law shall be guilty of an offence and on conviction therefor shall be liable to a penalty of not more than \$50,00 exclusive of costs which shall be recoverable under the Summary Conviction Act all of the provisions of which shall apply except that any term of imprisonment shall not be for more than 21 days.
