He was moved to hospital and operated on for bladder trouble on Saturday. He seemed to get over the operation all right and was feeling fine, when Mrs. Baine left him on Monday to go on to their home in Toronto to make arrangements for him coming home on Operation. His sudden death came as a great shock to her. The late Mr. Baine was 70 years of age. Sympathy is extended to the widow and sons, Albert and Bob, of Toronto, and the Rev. F. J. Baine, Schumacher, in their sad bereavement. The funeral will be held today (Thursday) at two o'clock to Park Lawn Cemetery.
