It was pointed out at the commission meeting that chief constable had never been appointed by by-law so the commission decided that they may as well have a chief. Last week the Timmins council passed a by-law that gave Timmins a jail and a police office and last night the clerk was told to instruct the council to pass a by-law appointing a chief constable.

The Timmins police force will now consist of a chief constable, Leo H. Gagnon; a deputy-chief, Jack Downey; a senior sergeant, Arthur Olsen; two sergeants, Joe Gariepy and Albert Lepic, one detective, Ernie Gagnon; one identification officer, George Archambeault and fourteen constables. This number is still, under the recognized safety line of one constable for each thousand people. The commission pointed out, though, that the chief had a hundred men in the Timmins Auxiliary Police Force that were ready to be called in any emergency.

A quotation was received from the Northern Electric Co. on electrical equipment. The commission is not buying any new equipment at the present time and had the letter fyled.
