

# Smooth Rock Falls First In All Canada

## Three Seriously Hurt When Truck Overtakes on Road at Gold Centre

Nellie Robson, 14 Years of Age, Unconscious for Hours.  
Cecilia Johnson, 13 Years old, Painfully Cut About Face.  
Dan O'Callaghan Driver of Truck, Had Ribs and Nose Broken.

Schumacher, June 1st—(Special to The Advance)—A very unfortunate accident occurred on Friday afternoon about four o'clock on the Gold Centre road near Schumacher, resulting in the serious and painful injury of the three occupants of a truck that overturned. Dan O'Callaghan was driving the small truck belonging to D. Pianosi, grocer, First avenue, Schumacher, and in the truck with him were Nellie Robson, 14 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Robson, Fourth avenue, and Cecilia Johnson, 13 years old, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Johnson, Second avenue, who were driving out to Gold Centre. When reaching the small creek the truck apparently got out of control and plunged into the bush. Mr. Lambert Taylor, of Gold Centre, was cycling home from the mine, and was just ahead of the truck. He heard the crash as the truck turned over and hurried to the scene of the accident. A glance told him the seriousness of the crash and he rushed to Gold Centre for help and to phone the doctors. Mr. Ernie Dunbabin hurried back with Mr. Taylor, while Mrs. Dunbabin phoned for medical help and for an ambulance, and then hurried to the scene of the accident to help. Dr. MacLean and Dr. Armitage were soon at the scene and had the three injured young people removed to St. Mary's hospital.

Nellie Robson appeared the most seriously injured, remaining unconscious after being removed to the hospital. In addition to possible injuries to the skull she was also suffering from a broken arm.

Cecilia Johnson received painful cuts on the face from glass, her head going through the windshield in the accident. She was operated on when she arrived at the hospital and it was found that her eyes were all right, none of the glass having injured them. In addition to cuts about the face she had a leg injury, but latest reports are that she is resting comfortably and is not in serious condition.

Dan O'Callaghan, son of Mr. and Mrs. O'Callaghan, Coniurium property, who was the driver of the truck, had four ribs broken and also suffered a fracture of the nose. After treatment he was able to leave the hospital on Saturday.

AT NOON TO-DAY—the latest reports on the condition of Nellie Robson who was injured on Friday afternoon when D. Pianosi's truck driven by Dan O'Callaghan hit loose gravel near Gold Centre causing the driver to lose con-

trol of the truck, were more hopeful this morning. Word was received to the effect that although she has not gained consciousness she is resting comfortably and is able to take stimulants.

Cecilia Johnson who was also injured in the accident had her leg put in a cast this morning when it was learned through X-ray that her leg had been fractured.

## Over the Top in Ten Minutes

## Liquor Raid Friday Morning Results in at Least Two Charges

Man Charged With Keeping  
for Sale and Supplying

Alex Deslaurier and Elsie Braund, 41 Wilson avenue, will face charges at Timmins in police court next Tuesday afternoon as a result of a police raid at their residence early Friday morning. The raid was conducted at 3:40 a.m. and police are charging Deslaurier with keeping for sale as well as supplying beer to an interdicted person. Elsie Braund is charged with drinking beer while an interdicted person.

Police say that there were five persons in the place drinking when they entered and as yet the police have not decided whether they are going to charge them as found-in or not. A quantity of beer was seized in the raid.

## Picked Platoon From Camp Borden Pays Visit to Timmins at Week-end

Men From Royal Canadian Regiment on Tour of the North. Given Civic Reception Here. Special Demonstration Staged at Hollinger Park. Men Took Only Ten Seconds to Don Gas Masks.

A picked platoon of men from the Royal Canadian Regiment, stationed at Camp Borden, and led by Captain Botting and Lieut. Collins, and accompanied by a band from the 48th Highlanders, invaded Timmins on Saturday afternoon and, literally, took the town. The men were transported by four 1½-ton trucks of the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps.

The men left Kirkland Lake on Saturday morning and paraded through each town that they passed on the way to Timmins. All told the men had nine parades on Saturday. Two of the nine parades were in Timmins.

The fine body of men were given a civic reception at the town hall. Mayor J. Emile Brunette gave a short address of welcome to the men and cigarettes were distributed to them through the courtesy of the Timmins Lions Club. The cigarettes were distributed by Miss Jackson of the town hall staff and Councillor Ellen Terry.

In his remarks of welcome to the troops, Mayor Brunette expressed the sentiments of all when he said that the people of Timmins were pleased to have a visit from them. The mayor told them that they were the second convoy of troops to come to Timmins this year and added that he hoped they would enjoy themselves during their short stay here.

On Saturday night at 7:30, the platoon staged a special demonstration at Hollinger ball park for several hundred of the townspeople that were able

to attend. At the park they were again welcomed by Councillor Bill Roberts. In his short talk that followed the demonstration Councillor Roberts said that the troops were in Timmins to add interest to the recruiting of men as well as to take part in the parade in opening the Victory Loan drive that started yesterday.

Councillor Roberts said that Canada needed many recruits and that Canada needed a large amount of money to equip the troops. Without the money, the troops were of no use and without the money the money was of no use, the speaker said. The men were thanked for the fine demonstration that they had staged.

The demonstration in itself was an example of what well-trained troops can do. The men entered the park and marched all around the side of it before coming up to the saluting base. The men marched past the saluting base and then put on their short demonstration.

The platoon went through several of the phases of platoon drill, such as marching, fixing bayonets, etc., and then they were ordered to put on their gas masks. It took the entire platoon only ten seconds to put the masks on and after they were on the men were marched around for a short while.

The crowd of several hundred that had gathered at the park were well pleased with the demonstration and gave the platoon a fine ovation as they completed their demonstration.

## Liquor Raid Last Night Results in Arrest of Four

Two are Jointly Charged  
With Keeping for Sale  
and One With Illegal Possession.

Timmins police carried out a raid last night at 173 Pine Street, South, and as a result four persons will face charges in tomorrow's police court. Jean Barre, 34 years old, and giving his occupation as a store clerk, is jointly charged with Mrs. Leona Alsazio, the owner of the store, with keeping liquor for sale. Police entered the establishment about 9:15 last night and found several persons drinking beer. Police describe the premises as being the usual bootlegging set-up with bottles on the floor and very little furniture in the house outside of a table and chairs.

Another person, Annette St. Martin, aged 30, was charged with illegal possession of beer in the same raid. Police entered her room in the house and found some bottles of beer. She failed to show the police that she had purchased them in the prescribed manner.

George Orankin, 170 Elm Street, North, was charged with failing to produce a National Registration Card. This also happened in the same raid. Police are alleged to have found him in one of the rooms in the house and when asked for his registration card, he failed to produce it.

Theodore Noel, 19 years old, is charged with being drunk in charge of a car as a result of the Timmins police being called to an accident on Wende Avenue last night. Noel is alleged to have backed a car that did not belong to him out of a driveway and collided with a car being driven by Miss Doris Passmore.

Thomas Stafford, 222 Birch Street, South, is facing a charge of having wine in other than his private residence. Police are alleged to have surprised him and two other men at the place that is known as the "jungle" near the golf course. It is a place frequented by the "grofers." The three men were described as just about ready to start drinking the wine.

Two men were charged with being drunk and were entered as first offenders. One man was charged with speeding.

Moses Cain, 184 Elm Street, North, a timber foreman at the Aunor Mine, was fatally injured on Friday morning at about eight-thirty, when he fell down a chute from a stope. Injuries sustained in the fall were a fractured skull, a fractured pelvis and a fractured spine. The man died at the Porcupine General Hospital at 5:00 p.m. on Friday.

The late Mr. Cain was 53 years of age and came to Timmins over ten years ago. The remains were at home till this morning when the service took place at 9:00 a.m. Interment took place at the Catholic Cemetery in Timmins and the service was held in the Church of the Nativity. The late Mr. Cain was born in the Province of Quebec and is survived by a wife and children.
