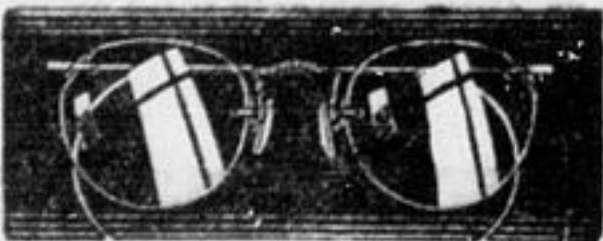

He had read of the fortunes made by film stars, and decided to become one himself. Now he has just finished his latest film in which he plays an important role and which may lead to the Hollywood offers he has been waiting for.

Born on 29th May, 1909, and educated at Edinburgh Academy and Sandhurst, he resigned a commission that he had held for three years in the Black Watch, crack Highland Regiment of which the late King was Colonel; took lessons in singing and acting; and finally got himself a job at \$4 per week in the chorus of "Wild Violets" at London's most famous theatre, the Drury Lane.

None of his friends in the chorus knew that Bruce came from a family that could trace its descendants in an unbroken line from 1350; none of them knew that his holidays were spent in Edinburgh, where he would gaze at the Seton crest on gates leading to mansions that once belonged to his family and dream of the time when he could reclaim them.

The Seton coat of arms is engraved on a Cornelian ring which Bruce always wears, and which has been handed down to second sons of the family since 1429. An ancestor of his, Sir Alexander Seton, was incidentally, he first Chancellor of Scotland some three hundred years ago.

It was not long before Bruce was spotted in the Drury Lane chorus and given an important role in the revue "Stop Press."

Both are accomplished fencers; both are enthusiasts for this sport, and Bruce is something of a champion. He started by winning the Public Schools Championship and fenced four years for the army and five for Scotland.
