

Salvage Campaign at South Porcupine

Also Good Work Being Done by Kiwanis Boys' Hobby Club.

South Porcupine, June 7.—(Special to The Advance)—The following few notes on the Boys Salvage Campaign have been given us for the benefit of all who are interested.—

Collections for the old library building will be made every second and fourth Tuesday of every month after 4 p.m. Next collection Tuesday, June 9th, by Scouts, Cubs, and members of Kiwanis Hobby Club, and any citizens willing to assist.

Collection of papers, magazines, cardboard, tin foil, rags, old clothes, scrap iron, aluminium, rubbers, wire coat hangers, (Requested: papers be tied in bundles just as they are received from the stores. Magazines and papers be placed in separate bundles).—That old clothes etc be placed in sacks (furnished on request) or some suitable container.—That any extra wire coat hangers be included in salvage bundles.

Sorting: There is a great deal of piling and bundling to be done at the old library building; volunteer assistants will be welcomed on Mondays from 4 to 6, Wednesdays 4 to 6, and Thursdays from 6 to 8.

Any changes in the hours will be posted on the door of the building. Scrap iron, rubbers, cardboard boxes—preferably broken—and large objects will be stored at the Young Men's Club building.

Parcels to be collected: Contact Mr. W. Skinner or Mr. C. P. Walker, preferably on day of collection. In case of rain, collection will be made on the next fine day.

The Kiwanis Hobby Club is in full swing.

There seems to be much misunderstanding regarding this fine venture of the Kiwanis.

It is absolutely free to any boy or girl—no fees—just assistance with the salvage collection and sorting.

Every boy who is at least 8 years of age is welcome as long as he works on the salvage (which is helping to pay for the equipment).

Two woodworking classes are already under way and a junior archery club is progressing favourably.

Individuals or organizations wishing the use of the equipment should make application before June 22nd, to the director, Mr. Matt Mulcahy, who will be at the club on Mondays, Thursdays, Fridays after supper, and Saturday from 10.30 to 12 a.m.

If enough older men and women are interested in using the equipment after 9 o'clock on these nights, the shop will be open to them.

The equipment is excellent, including lathe, hand saw, jig saw, circular saw, planer, drill press, and fully equipped work benches.

This is a community enterprise not a private project.

Already outdoors motor boats, tables, what-nots, tie-macks, book-shelves, lawn ornaments, shoe-racks, and a number of bows and arrows have been turned out, so come along and get yourself a hobby in the woodworking line.
