Thirty-three British manufacturers sent overseas throughout last year an average of 1,125,000 blades a day. The enormous total of 456,250,000 blaces would, end to end, run to 12,600 mfles and the value of these exports is

£700,000 a year. The successful invasion of the great overseas market is a triumph for Britain's industrial organization in war time. The "strip" metal used for razor blades is made on rolling mills engaged on war production, yet the razor blade manufacturers have been able to secure the "strip" required to develop their industry.




