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Time Fighting Against the Huns, Says J. P. Bickell

Montreal.—J. P. Bickell, Canadian mining magnate, president of McIntyre Porcupine Mines, whose desire to aid in Britain's battle sent him across the Atlantic to London many months ago, is back in Canada, more convinced than ever that time is slowly but steadily working against the Hitler war machine.

The Canadian financier, here on an important mission for the British government, left England Sunday by plane. "I've delayed him at Newfound Lake on an interview last night," Mr. Bickell said that he expected to spend several weeks in Canada before returning to England.

"There isn't much I can say at the moment," he declared. "I am here on a mission for the government. What that mission is I am not at liberty to say. But it will keep me here several weeks."

Asked as to the British viewpoint on Canada's war effort, Mr. Bickell said he had heard nothing but expressions of satisfaction. "There is not the slightest doubt in the minds of all the people with whom I have come in contact concerning Canada's position in the war," said Mr. Bickell. "The British people are convinced Canada is making an all-out war effort. It is realized, of course, that the change-over from peacetime to a wartime economy is a difficult thing. But you can't expect to sow your grain in one day and reap the harvest the next."
