The Canadian financier, here on an hier and mission for the British govriment, left England Sunday by the Per delayed him at Newtoning In the win anterview last night Mr. Bickell said that he expected to spend several weeks in Canada before returning to England.

"There isn't much I can say at the moment," he declared. "I am here on a mission for the government. What that mission is I am not at liberty to say. But it will keep me here several

Asked as to the British viewpoint en Canada's war effort, Mr. Bickell said he had heard nothing but expressions

"There is not the slightest doubt in the minds of all the people with whom I have come in contact concerning Canada's position in the war," said Mr. Bickell. "The British people are convinced Canada is making an all-out war effort. It is realized, of course that the change-over from peacetime to a wartime economy is a difficult thing. But you can't expect to sow your grain in one day and reap the harvest the next."
