Rare Comedy in New Dr. Christian Film, Remedy for Riches

Jean Hersholt Stars in Sparkling Comedy.

In the double feature programme at the Cartier theatre, on Friday and Saturday, of this week, there is another Dr. Christian film. A romance soon develops between the young couple, which is threatened with destruction when Shadow is accused of a series of fur robberies actually committed by the renegades, Tony Paton and Wade Crosby.

The story rushes toward a climax in typical Jack London fashion, with several unusual twists contributing to the novel ending.

Others in the cast are Brandon Hurst, Joseph Beranard, Eddie Kane and Ed Brady.

"Sign of the Wolf" was directed by Howard Bretherton from the screenplay by Elizabeth Hopkins and Edmond Kelso.

Man Charged With Manslaughter is Remanded One Week

Charge is Laid by Provincials After Tragic Accident Sunday Morning in Which Alma Cripps Loses Life.

Memories of the tragic accident that took the life of sixteen-year-old Alma Cripps last Sunday morning on the highway just past the Pamour, were brought back in Police court this week when the driver of the car, Emile Goulet, charged with manslaughter was given a week's remand. The bail for the youth was set at \$5000 property or \$2,500 cash. The bail was put up by the lad's father and the boy walked out of the prisoner's box. The hearing will probably go ahead next week.

It was a sad day for anybody that faced the magistrate on Tuesday, especially anybody that was charged under the Liquor Control Act or anybody that was from Mountjoy Township. Four persons from Mountjoy Township faced Magistrate Atkinson on Tuesday's court to send it into overtime. Each of the four got a three-month term as the magistrate vowed that he was going to clean up the air in Mountjoy Township.

The Mountjoy Township people were not the only ones that suffered on Tuesday, though. A number of others also came in for some stiff sentences. Squire Oliver Ticknor, of Cochrane, charged with dangerous driving, could have gotten a tougher sentence than he did but the magistrate was lenient with him. Ticknor pleaded guilty to the charge but Magistrate asked to hear the evidence. When it was brought out in the evidence that the squire had been travelling on the Hollinger Plats in a manner that was dangerous for any person who happened to be on the road, the magistrate asked him if he had anything to say for himself.

Ticknor in defending himself said that lately he had been troubled with lumbago and had taken a lot of Frost's 222 tablets to ease the pain and that these tablets may have made him a little doozy. He admitted having one drink not long before but said that he was not drunk. He also added that he had never been in trouble over his driving before. The magistrate then told him that he would fine him \$50 and costs and would take his license away for 30 days. The magistrate said that the man's good driving record saved him from losing his license for a longer period. He also added that he had the power to impound the car.

There was a disagreement between Constable Bill Thomson, of the Tim-

mins police, and John Ciechowski the defendant in a drunk driving charge. Ciechowski pleaded guilty and said that he was a little bit drunk but Constable Thomson in giving his evidence said that the man was dangerously drunk. It appeared that the man had been driving in his car and had got off the road and was stuck in the sand near McDowell's Garage. He was trying to get the car back on the road when the law arrived to place him under arrest. Magistrate Atkinson said that he was going to agree with Constable Thomson that the man was dangerously drunk and sentenced him to ten days in jail. In addition the man loses his right to drive for six months and he loses the car for three months.

Marcel Arsenault, a waiter at the St. Charles Hotel, put up quite an argument before he was convicted. He marched a fine array of witnesses into the box to no avail. He was facing a charge of assault occasioning actual bodily harm. When the case was finished he was fined fifty dollars and costs or if he preferred he could spend thirty days in the district jail.

The complainant, Agar Dudgeon, said that he had been standing near the entrance to the St. Charles Hotel watching a fight that was in progress a little way up the street when all of a sudden somebody smacked him on the nose for no apparent reason. The witness said that it happened so fast that he didn't know who hit him, but was told by some friends. Two other witnesses had seen this man, Arsenault whom they knew approach Dudgeon and strike him.

Arsenault took the stand in his own defence and said that he had had some trouble with the man earlier in the evening. He was a waiter, he said in the Ladies' Room at the hotel and he said that earlier in the evening Dudgeon had entered the Ladies' Room not as an escort and that he had put him out. When he closed after twelve, he said, Dudgeon was waiting for him outside and had attempted to hit him. He had ducked the man's wild swing and had struck back in self defence, he said. He then started to call his witnesses. His witnesses included one of his fellow waiters in the hotel and both of their girl friends. Their evidence was exactly the same and at the conclusion of the hearing, the magistrate said that he didn't believe them. It was very strange, he said, that two impartial witnesses had not seen Dudgeon attempt to strike Arsenault but that the defendant's witnesses, who were very good friends of his saw Dudgeon start the trouble.
