

# Eight Snappy Bouts on Programme of Boxing at the McIntyre Arena

## Main Bout Between Mangotich and Dusciaume. Seven Other Bouts of Much Interest With the Boys Showing Much Skill, Training and Good Sportsmanship.

Sixteen amateur boxers took part in an eight bout boxing card at the McIntyre Arena, Thursday, June 26th, at 8.15 p.m. The event was arranged by Bob Crosby. Although there was only a small attendance at the fight, those who had the privilege of watching it were greatly satisfied. The main bout was the Mangotich-Dusciaume bout, which lasted four rounds.

Mangotich got the nod over Maurice Dusciaume in the main bout of the evening. Both boys fought especially well and gave the fans an exciting and thrilling exposition of a fine boxing match.

In the first round Maurice Dusciaume of the T.P.A.A.A. showed himself to be the better man. He came in with terrific rights and lefts to Mangotich's head, then dodged quickly and gracefully away from the hail of blows fired by Mangotich. Both boys finished the round-off in fine manner, each swinging lefts and rights to the body of his opponent.

The second round showed Maurice rushing out to meet Buddy. He swung lefts and rights at Mangotich's body; but Buddy retaliated with a terrific right to Dusciaume's jaw. Buddy starred during the greater part of this round, although Maurice finished it off with hard rights and left to Buddy's body.

The third round had the house in an uproar. Both boys were alternately swinging, slaughtering lefts and rights to the face and body of his opponent. These blows left their mark, and had the boys tired out at the end of a beautiful round of boxing.

Dusciaume came in like lightning, in the fourth, driving his blows fast and hard; then Mangotich let loose with terrific rights and lefts to the body of Maurice. Mangotich was announced winner over Dusciaume. Buddy stated that "Maurice is a good fighter" and that they had "a close fight." Maurice said that Buddy was in fine shape. "But," he said, "I'll fight him again." Both boys gave a good example of true sportsmanship.

The semi-final bout between Maurice Lavigne of the T.P.A.A.A. and Alcide Theriault of the "K" Club was a fight worth seeing. Both Lavigne and Theriault showed how to use their fists as a weapon of defence as well as of offence. Fine boxing prevailed throughout the bout; but the boys were too well matched to acclaim a winner.

The judges called the fight a draw. Gerald (Pewee) Theriault and Carl Mangotich fought out to a draw in an exhibition bout. Both Theriault and Mangotich gave a fine display of foot-work and both of the boys sparred through the first two and a half rounds; then they opened up to end the fight with a great deal of leather throwing. Both boys were good sports and broke clean when ordered.

Two young fellows of the T.P.A.A.A. who show promise of becoming good fighters are Jimmy Monk and Percy Andrechuk. Both boys were aggressive throughout the fight. Their fight was dominated by their trading of punches. Monk was acclaimed winner in this well-matched bout.

Harvey Greer, of Schumacher, and Theo Meunir, of the T.P.A.A.A. in the 90-lb. class put up an excellent fight. Meunir had the better of the fight in the first two rounds, but it evened off fairly well in the last, with Theo driving in upercuts and Greer sending in blows to the midriff of Theo. Theo won over Greer in this exciting bout.

In the 78-lb. class Harold Fraser of the T.P.A.A.A. defeated Angelo DeMille of Schumacher.

Norman Scott and Len Knox both of the T.P.A.A.A. battled together in the 55-lb. class. Scott came out victor in this struggle.

The great little fighters of the Timmings Police Club are: Roy Garant and Reg Degrace both 40-lbs. These boys battled with over-whelming ability. Garant got the nod from the judges in this battle.

All the fighters in last night's card proved to be good sports and the men in charge of the clubs are to be congratulated on their fine work with the boys.

## Thousands from the United States in Canadian Army

Between 6,000 and 7,000 men from the United States are serving in the Canadian Army, Colonel the Hon. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, told the graduating class of Colgate University at Hamilton, N.Y., this week when he received from that institution the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. In addition 600 of the staff of pilots or instructors in or attached to the Royal Canadian Air Force are from the U.S., as well as about 1,500 pupils trained or training in the air plan, the minister stated.

Dealing with Canada's part in the war, Col. Ralston emphasized that the greatest enemy on this side of the Atlantic is the idea that there is plenty of time, an enemy that received a staggering blow in the recent evacuation of Crete. "There is no doubt we have slept too long," he continued. "Already since the war began tens of millions of men and women have lost their freedom. We who took democracy for granted see a whole continent back to the night of the Dark Ages when the whim of the dictator or the monarch was sufficient to deprive a citizen of his liberty, his property, his head or all three. We realize that it is only when the people themselves can take and keep government in their own hands that the way of life we prize can be enjoyed."

## Merchant Near Hearst Has Appealed in Big Fur Case

Arsene Brochu, merchant at Halliburton, near Hearst, has entered appeal against conviction and sentence in what is believed to be one of the largest fur cases in any Northern Ontario court. Brochu was charged with unlawfully attempting to export fur from Ontario without an export permit or paying royalty. He was convicted by the magistrate and fined \$2,200 and costs of \$202, the alternative being eighteen months' imprisonment. He has posted a bond for \$4,000 pending the hearing of the case by the appeal court, and so is free in the meantime.
