R.A.F. RESUMES GERMAN BOMBING

The Royal Air Force has also been carrying the fight to the enemy in the last few weeks.

German objectives have been pounded daily by the R. A. F. and some of the objectives are now in ruins. The Nazi-occupied coast of France has come in for a big share of the bombing and Berlin has been visited very often. Last night the R. A. F. is reported to have blasted at industrial objectives in the Aachen and Cologne areas of Germany, doing considerable damage and starting numerous fires. The London report adds that the air bombardment of Germany, which had been halted temporarily by bad weather, was resumed again last night. The raids last night were said to have been just as destructive as any that Germany has experienced lately.

The German air force is also reported to have visited England again last night but the damage is reported to have been slight. Only a few of the night raiders were able to get over England and they dropped bombs at scattered points in the east and south-west parts causing very slight damage.
