Rumors of a "strong arm protection gang" which selects as its victims those sorts and bootlegging establishments in the Sudbury district are seething in city circles today.

In their protection racket activities the group concerned seems to have kept well under cover for so far they have kept their operations from official circles. But police are keeping a close watch on the situation, and threaten to clamp down on the offenders if they continue their work.

Ignorant of the fact they were watching a flareup of these underworld activities, residents of the city watch ed for the brief few seconds it lasted a fight Saturday night at the corner of Elm and Lisgar streets.

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
