Captures the St. Paul Open Championship as Well as Sixteen Hundred Dollars.

There was no argument Sunday on that point among the 7,000 spectators who saw the Pinehurst, N.C., professional turn his wizardry into a great final round 63 that brought him the St. Paul open championship and its \$1,600 first money on a 72 hole total of 276, 12 under Keller course's par.

Over Thousand Wrestling Fans Turn Out Tuesday Night to See Tony Galento Referee Bouts

Event at the McIntyre Arena Tuesday Night Was Big Success. McIntyre May Bring Up Jack Dempsey in September. Galento Big Favourite With the Crowd.

Over a thousand wrestling fans crowded into the McIntyre arena on Tuesday evening to see a fine show that started off the McIntyre Sports attractions for the summer months. The McIntyre expects to promote another such card early in September when an attempt to secure Jack Dempsey as the referee will be made.

Bob Crosby presented a fine card on Tuesday night to get the thing started and is confident now that the sport will go over in these parts if a good brand of wrestling is presented. In the two hours show that was put on in the arena Tuesday, the local fans had their fill of the best wrestling obtainable.

"Whipper" Billy Watson, 226 pound Toronto product, proved to be a crowd pleaser right from the start. He took the crowd's fancy the minute he stepped in the ring and the "bad man" tactics of Cy Williams, his 230 pound Florida opponent, made crowd like him all the more. For over half an hour the two heavyweights threw themselves around and tortured each other with their favourite holds before Watson finally took the first fall. The second fall was only three and a half minutes after they had started after a ten minute intermission.

Both wrestlers came out at the start in the pink of condition and when they started to throw each other around the fans had no doubt that they were in condition. The men were carefully watched by Tony Galento as they tried to get their favourite holds. At various times Galento would have to separate them and when he did they didn't try to argue with the No. 1 contender for Joe Louis' championship. After more than a half an hour of tossing each other around Watson secured the first fall with a series of flying tackles and his favourite hold, the "Irish Whip." Williams stayed there for a couple of minutes. He was knocked cold.

Williams recuperated somewhat in the intermission but he was still groggy when he came back and before long Watson floored him with a bone-crushing bear-hug. The second fall was all over in three and a half minutes.

The "Masked Wolf" looked like the toughest man in the bunch when he came out in the semi-final. He was entirely covered with a black cloth and his face was covered with a mask of the same material. He was a great big fellow weighing 250 lbs. and all muscle. Lee Henning, his 234 lb. opponent from Iowa took a lot of pounding before he was floored in about fifteen minutes. Henning was also the pick of the crowd, but he was thrown with a bear-hug after he had absorbed a series of body slams.

The opening bout ended in a draw. George Richards, 225 lbs. Canadian boy, who has just finished a successful campaign in California rings, and Dick Bishop, 202 lb. Texas lad put on a good show before the time limit was reached. Both boys threw each other around a lot and the bout was faster than either of the other two. There was more tossing around in this bout and very little of the punishing holds that brought both men to the floor. At the finish of the bout both men were on the floor and Joe Thomas, who refereed the first two bouts had quite a time getting them untangled.

Jimmy Donald Still Leads South Section Baseball Hitters

Two Kirkland Men are Hitting Over .400 While Donald Leads With Prenomenal .469.

Kirkland Lake, June 30—Jimmy Donald, stellar Toburn second baseman, continues to display phenomenal hitting power in the Southern Section of the Temiskaming Baseball League, according to the latest edition of hitting averages, released this week. Donald has replaced Wright-Hargreaves' Orval Privett who has dropped down to the .333 bracket due to a recent three-game hitting slump.

Donald, a slow starter, appears to be in the middle of his hitting stride at the present time, and has a generous lead over the rest of the pack. He paces his nearest team-mate by well over 100 decimal points with his .469 far ahead of Art Hillman's .333.

The Toburnite's occupation of top stop in the "Big Seven" standing was expected by sport fans, but here is an angle which is causing quite a commotion in baseball circles. A bad fourth in the team averages last time, Wright-Hargreaves has climbed to the top with a .269 average, replacing Toburn in the lead position by one decimal point. Lake Shore has submerged to the cellar with a weak .173 effort.
