## Anxious to Restore the Vanishing Old-time West

Robert Taylor Gives Graphic Story of West in "Billy the Kid."

A highly pertinent suggestion to solve the problem of the vanishing Old West has been made by Robert Taylor, now starring in the title role of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's "Billy the Kid," at the Palace theatre Friday, Friday midnight and Saturday, Aug. 1st and 2nd.

"Unless something is done either by private individuals, in the manner that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., effected the Colonial Williamsburg restoration, or by inclusion in the government's National Park and National Monument programme, in a few years there will be no more old-time West except within the covers of books," says Taylor. "Barbed wire, the criss-crossing of concrete highways, and most certainly the flivver automobile are factors destroying the open range and the vigorous, completely American-out-of-doors life which went with it."

"My idea is to set aside 500,000 to a million acres of open range from available government lands and declare that property to be a Western Ranch National Park or National Monument. Cattle ranching, both experimental and practical, could be conducted exactly as it was in the days of the Chisholm Trail and the open range. Automobiles would be stopped at the ranch gates. Transportation would be by horse only. As was done at Williamsburg Virginia, authentic buildings of the period could be built, and at the proper season there would be round-ups with full branding operations.

"Just as admission fees aid greatly towards the upkeep of our National Parks, so could such fees bear the cost of this particular enterprise, designed to safeguard the traditions of the Old West."

## George Formby Will Help Chase Away Gloom and Care
