In 1930, in the British Empire games held in Hamilton, Ontario, McCready won the British Empire Amateur heavyweight championship.

Turning pro, McCready went on to win the Canadian championship and later, in England, the British Empire championship, which he has successfully defended in South Africa, New Zealand, Australia, Canada and Eng-
