

Hollinger Wins First Play-Off Game 3-2

Earl McCready Signed for the Semi-Final Bout at McIntyre Arena Tonight. Other Bouts

McCready is British Empire and Canadian Heavyweight Champion. James J. Braddock Will Referee the Bouts. Popular Favourites of Last Month Are Back Again.

James J. Braddock, former world's heavyweight boxing champion, will be the third man in the ring tonight at the McIntyre Arena when Jack Allen, Toronto sports promoter, presents his second wrestling card. Braddock replaced Tony Galento in Parry Sound a few weeks ago when Galento ran out on a refereeing engagement there.

Braddock, described as the Cinderella Man of the ring won the title from Max Baer on June 13th, 1935, and lost it on June 22nd, 1937, when he was knocked out by Joe Louis after eight rounds of fighting. Louis has held the title ever since.

Braddock was in the fight business for years before he won the championship but hard luck seemed to follow him. He was never able to get near the top. In 1935 he was working as a stevedore in the Eastern U.S. shipyards when he again decided to try the fighting game. This time he met with more success and very shortly had a fight lined up for the world title. Boxing, at that time, was at a low ebb and Braddock had little trouble dancing to the title in a fifteen round bout with Playboy Maxie Baer. He held the championship for a couple of years till he met Joe Louis at the peak of his meteoric rise and was knocked out in

the eighth round. Braddock then campaigned for a return bout but never got it. After several more fights in the heavyweights class he retired to devote his time to touring the country in personal appearances.

Another internationally famous figure who will grace the ring at the McIntyre tonight is Earl McCready, British Empire and Canadian heavyweight champ. McCready was signed by Allen last week-end and he is undoubtedly one of the most imposing names on the card. McCready who scales a little more than 240 pounds, has successfully defended his title in Canada, England, South Africa, New Zealand and Australia. McCready will appear in the semi-final against Ernie Powers who appeared in the opener here last month against Dick Bishop.

Headlining tonight's card will be the popular favourite of last month's card, "Whipper" Billy Watson, of Toronto, and "Sliding" Billy Hanson, of Salt Lake City. Watson, Canada's contender for the world's title, was the winner in an international tournament in Toronto some months ago and his favourite hold is the "Irish Whip" which he used effectively to trim Cy Williams in his first appearance at the McIntyre last month. Watson scales 226 pounds and will have a two pound advantage over Hanson who scales 224 pounds.

"Sliding" Billy Hanson is described as a real good showman and is expected to put on one of the best shows ever seen here. He has a large variety of holds and uses them all. He has earned for himself the name of the man with a thousand holds.

The preliminary on tonight's card is sure to be a crowd pleaser. The Masked Wolf and Cy Williams are matched together. In his first appearance here, the Masked Wolf, who hails from the States, has been one of the outstand-

ing drawing powers in the ring in the past few seasons. In Toronto he engaged in fourteen main bouts without a single loss. The Wolf scales a mere 250 pounds, and is regarded as one of the "bad men" of the ring.

Opposing the Masked Wolf will be Cy Williams, of Tallahassee, Florida, who weighs 235 pounds. Williams was the bad man in a main bout with Watson here last month and the crowd will be out to see him get trimmed tonight. He also has a large variety of holds and is known as the "Tallahassee Terror."

Braddock is expected to outdraw Galento here by a big margin. All along the route he has drawn bigger crowds than Galento did. North Bay is to be included in the northern circuit this time and is expected to boost the northern figures quite a bit. Besides appearing at these wrestling bouts as referee, Braddock is also donating his services to several other organizations. In Toronto last week he appeared at a softball game sponsored by the Sports Service League and the next day he donated his services at a golf tournament sponsored by the same firm.

Earl McCready Has Colourful Career as Wrestling Champ

Has Successfully Defended His Championship in Africa, New Zealand, Australia and England.

Earl McCready, the British Empire and Canadian heavyweight champion, who wrestles Ernie Powers, of Vancouver, in one of the feature bouts at the McIntyre Arena tonight, has had a most colourful career both as an amateur and as a pro.

In 1928 McCready represented Canada in the Olympic games in Berlin, and reached the finals before dropping a decision to Don George. Later in the United States, in a "Big Ten" college conference, McCready evened the score by defeating George.

In 1930 in the British Empire games held in Hamilton, Ontario, McCready won the British Empire Amateur heavyweight championship.

Turning pro, McCready went on to win the Canadian championship and later, in England, the British Empire championship, which he has successfully defended in South Africa, New Zealand, Australia, Canada and England.

Robert G. Lee Has Won Northern Golf Title Five Times

Leads All Other Northern Golfers by Big Margin. H. Teskey, North Bay, Won Three Times.

Robert G. Lee, of North Bay, is just about the best golfer in Northern Ontario, according to the records of the Northern Ontario Golf Association. He has won the title five years of the sixteen years that the tournament has been held. Mr. Lee, still a fine golfer, has retired from tournament golf after setting up his fine record.

Another man with a fine record in the Northern Ontario Golf Association is H. Teskey, also of North Bay. He has managed to win the title three times and between he and Mr. Lee, the title has gone to North Bay eight times out of the sixteen times it was competed for. Mr. Teskey won in 1926, 1928, 1929, while Mr. Lee won in 1927, 1931, 1933, 1935, 1938.

Only two other golfers have managed to win the title more than once and they are Johnny Poupore and Bob Barringer. Poupore won the title for Halleybury in 1936 and then won it again for Timmins the following year. Bob Barringer won the crown in 1939 and this year.

Four other men have won the title once. Cliff Ollivier, who was runner-up this year won the crown in 1930. R. Tomlinson, of Sudbury, won it in 1932 and finished up in second place in 1933, 1939 and 1940. W. Edwards, of Sudbury, won the title in 1934 and Art Riley of Sudbury, won it in 1940.

North Bay leads all other towns in the championships, having won the mug half the times that it has been up for competition. Timmins and Sudbury are next best with three winning years each, while Iroquois Falls and Halleybury won the title one year each.

Tough luck player of the Northern Ontario golfers is B. Merwin, of Sudbury, who has lost out in the finals three times. The tough luck town is Sudbury whose golfers have finished in second place nine times.

Lou Nova Introduces New Series of Blows for Fight With Louis

Shock Punch, Pull Punch and Bullet Punch are Variations of Famous Cosmic Punch.

The late Marquis of Queensbury, who probably turned over in his grave when Lou Nova introduced yegi and the cosmic punch to the prize ring, should positively leap right out of his coffin when he hears the California husky's latest.

Looking big and strong from six weeks of roughing it, Nova reached New York this week to start serious work for his heavyweight championship bid, and all but floored the experts with a detailed description of what he is getting ready as a greeting for Joe Louis in the Yankee Stadium Sept. 19.

The fellow who tried yegi beliefs to beat Max Baer once and then whipped him again with what he mysteriously insisted was a cosmic punch last winter, seriously revealed that during his last six weeks in the Maine woods he perfected a whole series of socks for the Bomber. Reading from left to right, this stock in trade includes:

1. The shock punch, a straight blow.

2. The pull punch, a "rounded" wallop, apparently a form of hook.

3. The bullet punch, a sharp straight punch which he expects to toss at Joe with considerable success.

"These are variations of the cosmic punch," Nova said as he posed for photographers in a gym before heading for his training base at Pompton Lakes, N.J.

"Prof. Walsion Crocker Brown of Long Island, who showed me the cosmic punch, has perfected new theories in punching and body development and I studied them all the time I was in Maine."

The fact that Louis has a few punches of his own, which may not have fancy names, but can do strange things to guys who absorb them, didn't bother Larruping Lou a bit.

"If Joe starts to slug, I'll give it right back to him," he boasted. "I guarantee I won't take a backward step. Maybe Louis punches harder than I do, but I think I have a greater ability to take it and I'm willing to trade with him any time, because he can't possibly take the punishment I can."

The records reveal that the last fellow who tried trading with the Bomber woke up several minutes later wondering what made the roof fall in.

Trounce Macassa Badly in Last Game Before Play-offs. Play-offs Start Tomorrow.

Kirkland Lake, Aug. 20 (Special)—Warming up for their Temiskaming Baseball League finals which they start against Wright-Hargreaves Friday, Toburn Beavers clinched first place in the standing of the Southern Section here Monday afternoon by trouncing the last place Macassa Maulers, 11-1.

Hollinger Bombers Win Out in the Ninth Inning Yesterday in the First of Play-Off Series

Second Game Will be Played at McIntyre To-morrow Afternoon. Series is to Decide Winners of First Half. Oumet's Error at Third is Responsible for Win.

Vince Barton's Hollinger Bombers won the first leg of their play-off series against McIntyre for the championship of the first half of the league last night when they turned back a determined McIntyre threat in the ninth inning to finish on the top side of a 3-2 score. It was one of the most thrilling finishes here for some time and was even a better game than the tenning affair that the same two teams played last Friday.

The second game of the series will be played at the McIntyre Park to-morrow afternoon and if the Hollinger win tomorrow's game the Macs will be through for the season. At the end of the first half the two teams were tied and the executive decided that they would have to play a three-game series to decide the first half. If McIntyre happens to win the next two games then a best of five series will have to be played for the league bunting.

Pat Wilson batted himself into the hero spot last night and then sat on the bench to see Louie Oumet kick the game away in the last half of the ninth. Barton replaced Dupuis in the ninth to get a single and advance Dorey to third base. On Oumet's error Dorey scored with the winning run and two men out. In the McIntyre half of the ninth inning Pat Wilson banged out a three-base knock to score Jack Thayer who had been given a walk to tie the game. Just when it began to look like extra innings Oumet kicked the game away. Before that time Oumet had played flawlessly.

Hollinger didn't lose much time getting started and in the second inning they hammered in two runs that began to look big as a house as the game went along. Four hits brought the two runs in and then another run was chocked off at the plate when Eddie Dunn made a long throw from centre field to catch Dorey at the plate. Lawton singled to start it and was advanced to third by Oltean's single through short stop. A passed ball let Oltean get to second and he was held there when Dorey singled to score Lawton. Dupuis fanned and Karahan slapped out his first base hit to score Oltean. Romualdi fled to centre field and Dunn threw to the plate to catch Dorey for the third out.

From then until the fifth inning neither team could score and in the fifth McIntyre started to close up the gap. With two men out Edwards got on through Karahan's error at second. Cooke, next man up, doubled to right field and Edwards scored. Oumet fled out to leave Cooke at second.

The Macs tied up the game in the ninth inning only to have the Bombers win the game in their half of the inning. Two men were out again when the Macs got started and it was Jack Thayer who got on first base on a walk. Pat Wilson then replaced Kosick with the hickory and banged out a three-bagger to tie the count. Richardson, next man up, fled out to first base to end the inning.

The Bombers came back with a vengeance in their half of the inning and had the game won before there were three men out. Oltean, first Bomber up, was thrown out at first and then Dorey singled to centre field. Barton went in to replace Dupuis and he sent a fly out to short stop that Richardson missed. By the time the ball was back in play Dorey was on third base. Karahan fled out to third base then and Romualdi sent a scorching drive to Oumet that the little Frenchman fumbled, and Dorey pranced in with the winning run.

Dart League Holds Season's Initial Meeting Sunday

One More Team is Needed to Complete the Schedule. Decide to Draw for Doubles Teams.

The annual meeting of the Timmins Dart League was held at the Legion Hall on Sunday afternoon and the schedule for the coming season was drawn up. The schedule called for twelve teams but as yet there are only eleven teams entered so there is an opening for another team.

The schedule was drawn up by Secretary Jimmy Gordon and was accepted unanimously by the executive. In the event that another team is not entered one team will be given a bye each night that they are supposed to meet the team that is on the schedule. The first competition of the year will be for the Legion Cup and play will start for the cup on Monday, September 1st.

One of the important questions settled at Sunday's meeting was about the Doubles competition for the Rice Trophy. The executive decided that they will draw the names for the doubles teams. This will eliminate any team being too strong for the rest of the teams. Some of the lads in the league had their partners already picked and they presented a couple of very strong teams. The motion was moved by Art Leonard that the doubles teams be drawn and it was seconded by A. Jenkins.

Each club will be allowed to carry eight players and the dues will have to be paid to the secretary by September 26th. Team members will be assessed fifty cents for the season and active players will be charged one dollar. If a team is short-handed on any night and they have to use one of the spares, the spare will then have to pay the extra fifty cents to make up the regular fee.

A motion to make the league games a best of three series was turned down and the league will continue to operate on a basis of two games each night that they play. Games will be played every Monday and Friday nights.

Art Leonard suggested that the league start a fives competition and it was decided that it would be tried before a decision was reached.

Two changes were made on the executive committee, placing T. Mounsey and A. Jenkins on the committee.

Wally Armstrong read and explained some documents in connection with the club's application for a charter. The league will have to send in the names of the league directors or charter members and it was decided to send in the names of J. Gordon, A. Leonard, H. Hazelwood, H. MacPherson, P. Zanolla, T. Mounsey, W. Nixon, P. McCormick and H. Morin. The name decided upon for the Club was the Timmins Dart League.
