Mrs. E. Durocher of the Style Shoppe Furriers, has returned after a two months' holiday spent at Fort Coulonge.


The Guides of the 106th I.O.D.E. Company held their first meeting of the new season in St. Matthews' hall.

Timmins firemen answered a call to a serious fire last Friday evening when they were called to the Naybob Mine.

The fuse house was on fire and before the firemen could stop the flames the building was a total loss. The damage was estimated at about \$500 and was covered by insurance. The booster pump was used on the blaze.
