next Wednesday. As a result of this the council changed the date of next week's meeting to Thursday instead of Wednesday.

Caldick and Yates wrote the council telling them that the new regulations restricting the sale of gasoline forced the town to buy gas for their cars at local service stations after October 1st. It will be illegal for the town to take gas from their own pumps for any of the five cars that the town owns. It was decided that a fund would be set up in different gasoline stations and the town cars could get gas there when they presented an order. Gasoline will be bought from all the service stations.

The Township of Tisdale wrote to the council authorizing them to extend the water lines to the end of the town limits near the North End streets.

From the end of the town limits the township will carry the water to the subdivision in Tisdale. They also asked the town to obtain the right of way through the Empire Townsite. This is the property that the town is going to expropriate if the owners refuse to sell.

The Timmins Retail Merchants' Association wrote to the council asking that the town do what it could to widen Fourth Avenue from Spruce street to Pine street and also to widen the subway near Spruce street.

The traffic was very heavy in that section and the council was in favour of the proposition and will write to the T. & N. O. to see if they can get the subway widened.

The town was advised that their tender for the purchase of lot 596, 1/4 acre that was sold by the Custodian of Enemy Property last week, had been accepted and the town will write to a tenant on the property telling him that the town will want him off the property by May of next year.

Grants of \$625.00 to the Volunteer Fire Brigade and \$100.00 to the Timmins Horticultural Society were authorized. The Firemen's grant is the portion covering their third quarter and the grant for the Horticultural Society is their annual grant.
