Corporation of the Town of Timmins By-Law No. 641

BEING A BY-LAW regulating the emission of smoke into the atmosphere. WHEREAS it is desirable to restrict the period of time in which dense or opaque smoke may be emitted into the atmosphere.

BE IT ENACTED as a By-law of the Town of Timmins as follows:

1. Every owner, lessee, tenant, agent, manager or occupant of any premises or of a steam boiler in or in connection with which a fire is burning and every person who operates, uses or causes or permits to be used any furnace or fire shall prevent the emission of the atmosphere from such fire of opaque or dense smoke for a period of more than six minutes in any one hour or at any other point than the opening to the atmosphere of the flue, stack or chimney.

2. This by-law shall not apply to a furnace or fire used in connection with the reduction, refining or smelting of ores and minerals or the manufacture of cement or to dwelling houses except apartment houses.

3. Notice of this by-law shall be given by publication of the by-law in the Ontario Gazette and in the Timmins Daily Press for four successive weeks.

4. This by-law shall take effect 90 days after the notice provided by the previous section has been given.

5. Everyone contravening the provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$50.00 exclusive of costs which shall be recoverable under the Summary Convictions Act all the provisions of which shall apply except that the imprisonment may be for any term not exceeding twenty-one days.
