

N.O.H.A. Will Hold 23rd Annual Meeting at Haileybury Hotel in One Week on Saturday Oct. 4

Northern Ontario Hockey Association Has Gone a Long Way Since First Annual Meeting on October 8th, 1919. Some Ticklish Problems to Deal With This Year.

The 23rd annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association will be held at Haileybury this year on Saturday, October 4th. The meeting will start at two o'clock sharp and will be held in the Hotel Haileybury.

The Northern Ontario Hockey Association has gone a long way since the Association was formed on October 8th, 1919. Organized hockey came into existence in Northern Ontario when at the annual meeting of the Temiskaming Hockey League, to which delegates from Coburns to Sudbury had been invited, a resolution was passed favouring a Northern Ontario Hockey Association.

The climatic conditions gave to the north a splendid opportunity to develop this favourite sport to the fullest extent, and although individual efforts had been made by various towns to form a league to take in several clubs, no real organization had existed prior to 1919-1920. Angus D. Campbell, mining engineer at the O'Brien Mine in Cobalt was the real founder of the N.O.H.A. While a student at Varsity and, later, the Mines League at Cobalt, he had not only proved himself a star player, but an exponent of clean sport.

No, all of the credit, though, belongs to Mr. Campbell, but a little credit must also be distributed to the other men that helped to guide the destinies of the N.O.H.A. in its infancy. These men devoted much time to the Association and are the men that are responsible for organized hockey in the north today. Since its inception the N.O.H.A. has gone ahead by leaps and bounds and since then has taken several Canadian championships as well as being represented in the Canadian finals some years.

Many of the men who formed the N.O.H.A. are still in Northern Ontario today and are some of the most active men in the sport. Among those who were delegates at the first meeting of the Association were: Bill Brydges and E. McConomy of Iroquois Falls, W. Widdifield and G. S. Lowe of Timmins, J. R. Dier and W. Dixon of New Liskeard, N. F. Smith and N. B. Strong of Haileybury, T. Shaw and H. G. Kerney of Cobalt, W. Sullivan of North Bay, and J. P. Mader representing Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie. All of these men deserve due credit for attending the first annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association and laying the foundations on which the Association has prospered since.

Officers elected at the first annual meeting were: Angus Campbell, president; J. R. Dier, vice-president; H. P. Charlton, secretary-treasurer. The first executive of the association was made up of: G. S. Lowe, Timmins, M. G. Hanson, New Liskeard, N. F. Smith, Haileybury, W. Beaton, North Bay, J. P. Mader, Sudbury, and W. Widdifield, Porcupine.

On November 8th, 1919, exactly one month after it was formed, the Northern Ontario Hockey Association became affiliated with the Ontario Hockey Association and ever since they have operated under the rules and regulations of that organization. The N.O.H.A. adopted the residence rule of the O.H.A. in the first year and all members of teams in the N.O.H.A. were to hold registration cards issued by the A. A. U. of C. Exclusive jurisdiction was given to the N.O.H.A. covering the territory from Cochrane to North Bay and west as far as Sault Ste. Marie. The N.O.H.A. was to regulate and govern hockey in that district mentioned. The N.O.H.A. champions were given the right to play off with the Intermediate winners of the O.H.A. and if victorious they could continue along to play the senior winners of the O.H.A. Angus Campbell, president of the N.O.H.A. was elected to the executive of the O.H.A. at their annual meeting.

Since that time the annual meetings of the N.O.H.A. have had some very serious problems to consider and each time they have mastered them. This year is no exception and they have some more touchy subjects to deal with. In the past few years there have been jumbings from all quarters that the N.O.H.A. should sever their connections with the O.H.A. and that question will probably pop up at this year's annual meeting again. Year after year, teams from the north complain that once they are sent down to Toronto to play in the O.H.A. finals they have no chance to return north for any games. They are forced to play all of their games in the Maple Leaf Gardens and they don't like it. That is one of the questions that the N.O.H.A. annual meeting will have to wrestle with.

Another of the questions that may have to be given consideration is that of players not being allowed to enter the United States to play this year. Last week-end six Manitoba players were refused the right to enter the States this season and the same thing may happen in Ontario. These players will want to play for some team in the N.O.H.A. and they will want the right to choose the team that they want to play for. The spot that these players are in now is that they can play for no other team but the United States teams.

Each Club shall be entitled to representation by three delegates of members of the Executive of the Association, and each Club shall be entitled to one vote, the voting delegate being

the only one allowed to cast a ballot for the Club he represents (no proxy). Each Club is requested to notify the Secretary of the Association not later than Saturday, September 27th, the names of delegates and to designate the voting delegate.

Clubs having resolutions and amendments to the Constitution, etc., to place before the Annual Meeting must have same in the hands of the Secretary on or before Saturday, September 20.

Nominations for Officers, including the Executive, must be made in writing by a Club or an Officer of the Association, such nominations to reach the hands of the Secretary on or before Saturday, September 20. No one shall be nominated for more than one office. The Officers of the Association consist of a President, Vice-President, Immediate Past President and Secretary-Treasurer and one Representative from each of the original three groups in the Association, provided that group is not already represented on the Executive by one of the before-mentioned Officers, and provided always that there shall not be less than three Executive Members in addition to the Executive Officers; the President and Vice-President not to represent the same group.

Each Club is required to pay their Annual Fee, namely \$10.00 for Seniors, Intermediate and Junior "A"; \$5.00 for Junior "B", before or at the Annual Meeting. Entry fees are as follows: Seniors \$20 per team; Intermediates \$20 per team; Junior "A" \$10 per team; Junior "B" \$5 per team, and Juveniles \$1 per team.

Clubs will receive their Playing Certificates at the Annual Meeting. These should be filled in and returned to the Secretary of the Association at the earliest possible date.

All Clubs who were forwarded Transfer Application Forms are requested to have same completed and ready to hand in at the Annual Meeting.

Meet the Coniston Baseball Club That Plays Hollinger

Coniston Buzzers, the team that is playing Hollinger Bombers in the N. B. A. Final, is a good representative of the Nickel Belt. The team is managed by Snell Blake, brother of the famous "Toe" Blake of the Montreal Canadiens Hockey team. The following information and thumbnail sketches were forwarded to The Advance from Duparquet where the Buzzers appeared last week.

The following is the story: Coniston was winner of Nickel Belt League. Finished second in regular league schedule; Played Froid in the semi-final, and took the odd game in three. They then played the strong Copper Cliff nine and eliminated them three straight in a real surprise series. This snappy, scrappy little team is managed by Snell Blake, a brother of Toe Blake of Montreal "Canadiens" Hockey Team. He is a Coniston boy and is as game as they come, and shows many of the possibilities of his elder brother. Coach and field general is Everett Staples, one of those herring-choking boys from Nova Scotia (Liverpool). He is about the best receiver in the north, full of pep and chatter and the real spark-plug of the team.

The team is:
Roly McLenahan, Centre Fielder and Relief Catcher. This boy is still a junior and the sweetest hitter on the team. A real clouter and extra-base socker. Is reported to be slated for a try-out with Detroit Red Wings this winter.

George Gee: First sacker. A little awkward around the bag but coming along fast. Played only last month of schedule with club as sub-infielder. Took over first base duties at beginning of play-offs. Boy is only nineteen. Slated for a tryout with Chicago Black Hawks.

George Blake: Left Fielder. A real fly-hawk. Brother of Snell and of course related to the famous "Toe" Blake. Despite a leg operation missed only two games during season. Also a Junior and a good hitter.

Snell Blake: Manager who plays third-base. Made switch in mid-season, and has been going hot in that spot since. A good "punch" hitter.

Everett Staples: Catcher. Talks a great game behind the bat, and in the game fighting every inch of the way. Chief spark-plug of the team. Handles chucks perfectly. Also works as relief hurler. A Nova Scotian product. One of the sweetest receivers in the north to-day.

Ira Gardner: Left Fielder. A Westerner. Newcomer this year. Average Hitter. Maybe as Errol Flynn sez: "Comes from west—good field—no hit."

She was 64 years of age and had come to the Temiskaming district in 1905, when the Cobalt camp was experiencing its first boom. Mrs. Corville is survived by her husband, two sons, Wilfred of Kirkland Lake, and Albert of North Cobalt, and six daughters, Mrs. Bert Basterfield, of Hollywood, Cal., Mrs. Frank Ash of South Porcupine, Mrs. Nils Pers of Timmins, Mrs. Alf Simpson of Lorrain Valley, Mrs. Pets McKercher of North Cobalt, and Mrs. Wilfred Hartshorn of Toronto. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon from Albert Gospel Hall at Haileybury, Mr. Sam Taylor conducting services there and at the graveside in Mount Pleasant cemetery."
