

Barton's Bombers Lose Three in a Row

Coniston Buzzers Beat Tennant-Cherevaty Last Saturday to Extend Play in N. B. A. Series

Bill Tennant is Pounded from the Mound in the Third Innings by His Former Mates. Cherevaty Holds Winners in All but One Inning. Bombers Lead Hitting 11-9.

Snell Blake's Coniston Buzzers took on the best that Hollinger's Bombers had to offer last Saturday afternoon and then they walked off the field with a nine to eight win tucked under their belts. Bill Tennant started the game for the Bombers and in the third inning the former Nickel Belt star had to leave the mound in favour of Mike Cherevaty. Seven of Coniston's nine hits came in the first three innings as the Buzzers shelled Tennant without mercy.

Each team counted two runs in the second inning after going scoreless in the first and then in the third inning the Bombers scored only three runs against Coniston's five. It was in this inning that Tennant was taken from the box. The Buzzers still kept pecking away at Cherevaty in the next inning and counted another run to give them a three-run lead. In the fifth inning the Bombers got one of the runs back and they tied up the game in the eighth inning. Coniston scored the winning run in their half of the eighth inning.

Hollinger tried hard to tie up the game in the ninth inning when, with one out, McLennahan was forced to jump high into the air to spear Louie

Romualdi's drive that was heading for centre field. Vince Barton then went in to pinch hit for Dorey and he fanned.

Leading the hitters were George Gee and Roly McLennahan of the Buzzers crew. They each collected three singles in five trips to the plate. Lawton, Romualdi and Dorey each got two for the losers.

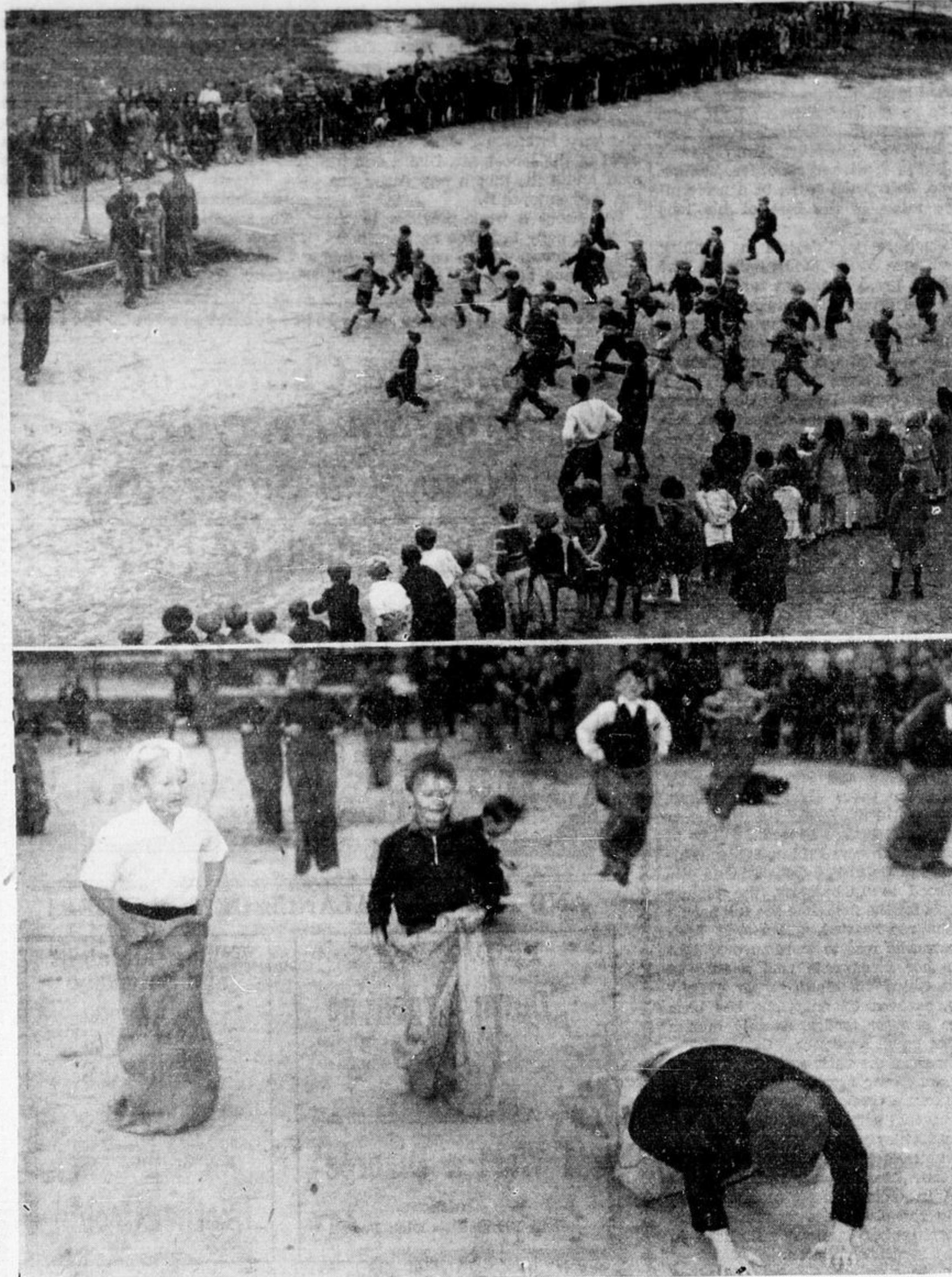
NICE SUBJECT

Coniston Buzzers Win from Bombers After Losing the First Three Games in N. B. A. Series

Hollinger Hauls Dorey in From Left Field to Pitch. Six Hollinger Errors Pave the Way for Coniston to Fashion a 6-2 Victory. Chase Gets Two Doubles.

Lashing back with relentless fury the Coniston Buzzers came from behind twice on Friday afternoon, in their N.B.A. play-off game with the Hollinger Bombers in Sudbury, to win by a 6-2 score. The win gave the Coniston team a lift in their best of seven series with the Bombers. Hollinger dragged Reg. Dorey in from left field to do their pitching and the Coniston team used their first line flier, Oren Price. Six Hollinger errors spelled doom for the men from the big mine on the hill.

Frank Chase's double, Bill Lawton's sacrifice and Louie Romualdi's single sent Chase in with the game's first run in the second inning. In their half of the same inning the Buzzers tied up the game again with two errors and a one base hit.

Frank Chase rapped out his second double in the fourth inning and it was the signal for the Bombers to go ahead again. Lawton slammed out a double to right field to score Chase.

In the fifth inning the Coniston bats started to beat out a rhythm that was sweet music to the Sudbury fans. The Hollinger team went all to pieces and on the errors the Coniston Buzzers

plled up their win margin. Gee and McLennahan rapped out singles in succession and then Frank Chase's ball throw on Staples' hard hit ball let both runners in and sent the Buzzers into the lead.

In the sixth inning the Coniston team again went on a spree that brought them another brace of runs. George Blake led off with his first hit of the series. Gardner slapped one back to Dorey who threw wild to first and Blake pulled up at third while Gardner went to second. Coniston then attempted a squeeze play and it worked with Blake coming in with the run. In his throw to first base Dorey went wild again and Gardner romped in from second base.

In the eighth inning the Buzzers again scored, this time helped with two bad errors. Chase threw wild on Price's grounder and Romualdi muffed Young's hit. Young started to steal second and Romualdi tried to tag him out. He missed the Coniston player and Price came in with the game's last run.

Joe Louis Again Defends His World's Heavyweight Title

Lou Nova is Battered Into Unconsciousness After Two Minutes, Fifty-Nine Seconds of Sixth Round.

Joe Louis, king of the modern heavyweight boxers, is still the champion. He shook off a big threat last Monday evening in his usual manner, by the knock-out route. His opponent, Lou Nova, lasted only six rounds before the Brown Bomber unloaded all of his devastating dynamite to beat the challenger into submission. The fight was all over when referee Arthur Donovan stepped in and stopped the massacre with only one second left in the sixth round.

The sixth round was disastrous for the California challenger as he was knocked down for a nine count near the start of the round and was barely able to get up. When he did get up Louis was all over him and it was just Louis' steady, hard punching that held Nova up. One second from the end of the round Louis stepped away and the challenger fell to the canvas, thoroughly beaten. Most of the sixty thousand fans that saw the fight agreed with Referee Donovan that it was useless for the fight to continue.

After the introductions and the referee's instructions the fighters came out for the first round and boxed cautiously. Not one solid blow was landed till near the end of the second round. In that second round a flurry of punches started near end of the round and each of the fighters broke about even on their exchange.

The third round was uneventful and then in the fourth round the champion again landed a couple of heavy blows that got Nova into trouble. In an exchange near the ropes in this round the challenger was knocked out of the ring. Nova came back again in the fifth round and he had a bit of an edge in this round but his edge was short lived as the champion got his sights trained on him in the sixth round and bombed him steady till the fight was stopped.

Nova went down in that sixth round near the start and he seemed to be hurt. At the count of nine it was all he could do to regain his feet and as soon as he did stand up the champion started the flurry of punching that was Nova's finish. Seldom in recent boxing matches have so many punches been thrown in such a short time.

Coniston Team Squares Up Northern Baseball Play-offs With Hollinger in Sudbury

Oren Price Wins Third Straight Game for Coniston. Cherevaty is Beat with Four Hit Effort. Bombers Commit Eight Costly Errors as Buzzers Take Game in Tenth.

Louis was pumping blows at Nova like a trip hammer and it was only the unusually fine physical condition of the challenger that kept him in the fight.

The loss for Nova represented his second defeat since he turned professional. In Philadelphia he stepped into the ring against Teny Galento and was beaten. He was in poor condition at that time, having just recovered from a long sickness, and he has since admitted that he should never have entered the ring.

In the most exciting finish to date in the Northern Ontario Baseball Association's play-offs the Coniston Buzzers defeated the Hollinger Bombers in the sixth game of the seven-game series to tie it up at three games apiece. The defeat was a record-breaking one for the Hollinger team. It was the first time this season that they have lost more than two games in a row. Although the Bombers out-hit the Buzzers they failed to get the hits when they were needed.

Uniteds Again One Point Up in the Timmins Dart Loop

Forge Into the Lead Again on Monday Night. Seven Up Behind With Imperials Third.

Uniteds fought back with a vengeance on Monday night in their Timmins Dart League games and managed to get to the top of the heap again. Coniston then came back strong and won the next three games with scores of 6-2, 11-0 and 2-1. The first game that they won they beat out Reg. Dorey, an outfielder. In the second and third games that the Coniston team won they beat Bill Tennant and Mike Cherevaty, the best that the Bombers have.
