Fire Prevention Demonstration Held at South Porcupine

Public and High School Pupils and Others Watch Event.

South Porcupine, Oct. 15.—(Special to The Advance)—Last Wednesday afternoon the Fire Department staged a fire prevention demonstration in the grounds of the public school which was enthusiastically applauded by both public and high school pupils and a fair number of adults.

The new extension ladder was placed in position against the school and Fireman Joe Miller mounted in double quick time and "rescued" Fireman Pacione from the third storey window, using the special fireman "hold" on the "unconscious victim" and then went up again and made another "rescue" from the roof.

Had the school been burning and the rescued real Joe would have got no greater cheers than he did from the assembled youngsters. The method used for resuscitation was also shown.

Demonstrations of holding a pyrene extinguisher to put out a fire—the use of "foamite" and the famous "fog-nozzle," were used on a fierce gasoline fire on the school grounds, the Fire Chief using a microphone to tell the crowd the action of the various chemicals used. A pit dug in the sand and partly filled with highly inflammable oil and gasoline was the scene of a very fierce blaze which was quickly subdued by the "fog-nozzle."

Previous to the demonstration a special fire prevention talk had been given to the public school children.

R.C.A.F. Mobile Unit is Meeting With Success for Recruits

R.C.A.F.: Proof of age (certificate or other satisfactory evidence); Proof of education, (original evidence); at least two letters of recommendation, recently dated, and addressed to the R.C.A.F. One letter should be from the present employer, if possible; Marriage certificate (if applicable); Birth certificate of children (if any); Discharge certificate, (if with previous military service).

Age limits for members of the air crew are over eighteen years and under thirty-one years for pilots, and over eighteen years and under thirty-three for observers and air gunners. Maximum height and weight for pilots is 6' 3", and 200 lbs. Maximum height and weight for observers and air gunners is 6' 0" and 175 pounds. Educational requirement for pilots is having obtained their junior matriculation and for air gunners and observers it is at least two years' high school education.

Pilot Officer Lamothe said that the medical examiner, Flying Officer Wilson, is equipped to give a candidate practical all of his examination here. Only the X-Ray tests have to be taken in North Bay. All trade tests can be performed here. The unit in Timmins at the present time is the best equipped unit that has operated out of North Bay since the plan was started.

Recruiting will continue till noon on Saturday when the unit will leave Timmins for other southern points. The unit is stationed in the basement of the Post Office and is open daily from 9 a.m. till 5 p.m. This evening the unit will be recruiting in the Post Office basement from seven o'clock till 10 o'clock.

Assisting Pilot Officer Lamothe and Flying Officer Wilson are Sergeant L. Nutwell and LAC Cliff Doran.
