

Season's First Hockey Tomorrow Night

Three-way Tie Now in the Northern Ontario Secondary Schools Association Football

Kirkland Lake, Iroquois Falls and Timmins Are All Square After Yesterday's Win from Iroquois Falls. Sudden-Death Play-Off Will be Ordered Soon.

Timmins High and Vocational School junior footballers romped their way to a nine to one win over the Iroquois Falls Indians yesterday afternoon at the Hollinger Ball Park to create a three-way tie in the northern section of the N.O.S.S.A. football set-up. The win tied them with Kirkland Lake and Iroquois Falls who each have two wins and two losses.

Timmins gridders were good, value for their win. They played the breaks to the best advantage and confined their activities to line drives that were less likely to end up in fumbles. Only on their third downs would they venture a kick and when they did decide to kick they didn't fool. All Timmins' kicks were long and dangerous ones. They usually sagged the opposing runner before he could get started.

School officials here were not in any position to say where the possession of the Duke Trophy would be decided but they thought that the N.O.S.S.A. executive would order a sudden-death game to be played with the Kirkland Lake team. They wouldn't venture a guess as to whether the game would be played here or in Kirkland Lake.

Cyril Ormston, Timmins quarterback, was the man who sent the locals into the lead when he kicked across a field goal that counted three points. Hart Drew cinched the game for the Blue and White in the third quarter when he scored a touch after Ormston had kicked to the line and the Indians had fumbled the ball. Ormston came in for a piece of this goal as well when he kicked over the convert to send the local seat of learning into a nine-point lead.

A Kushner, tall Falls halfback, saved the Iroquois Falls aggregation from a wash-out when he kicked the pigskin over from twenty-five yards out. Canie smothered the ball away behind the line but didn't even bother to try running it back out.

Iroquois Falls went on the offensive when the Timmins team kicked to them to start the game and they showed an edge in the first quarter. It wasn't till the Timmins team forced E. Cross from the game about halfway through the quarter that they could show any advantage. After he left the locals seemed to make more headway on their line plunges and long kicks.

In the second quarter J. Martin went through the middle of the line for a ten yard gain that set the stage for Ormston's three-point kick. Just after the score A. Kushner ran the ball back thirty yards for the Indians and then kicked it another twenty-five yards. Timmins took possession and tried a few plunges and were forced to kick. The kick brought the ball back into Iroquois Falls territory. Just before the half ended Kushner made a nice

Kirkland Boxer is Instructor in Overseas Army

The first division of Canadian troops overseas is training its best boxers to step up interest in this branch of sport. The Canadian Army has found that this is one of the best ways to keep their men in good shape. At a special camp where athletics and weapon training are combined a class of fifty-six boxers recently completed a two weeks' course and now that members have been sent back to their own units to instruct the other soldiers in boxing as well as carry out their other duties. There is a possibility that as a result of this boxing school, a Canadian boxing team will compete in the Allied boxing tournaments in Britain this winter.

Soccer players have been trained at the same camp for the same reason, to increase activity in that branch of the sport, and the First Division track and field team, which swept the boards to win the overseas army championship was also trained at the same camp. Timmins Junior Gridders Win First Game of Season Against Kirkland Maroons on Saturday

Fighting With Their Backs to the Wall the Timmins Team Scores Brilliant 6-5 Victory Over Team that Beat Them 12-6 Here on Thanksgiving Day.

Fighting against elimination the Timmins High and Vocational School junior gridders scored a 6-5 win over the Kirkland Lake Maroons on Saturday afternoon at last week at the Wright-Hargreaves Sports Field in a regular N.O.S.S.A. rugby fixture. The Maroons led the game 5-0 for more than three-quarters of the game before a fumble gave Timmins the chance they had been waiting for.

Kirkland opened the game with a strong offensive that saw Jimmy McNiven score the first touchdown at the nine minute mark. The convert failed and the Blue and White buckled down to real rugby. Angus Mortonson, who scored all the points against Timmins in a Thanksgiving Day game here was effectively bottled up and wasn't allowed to threaten at any time.

Timmins changed their style of play in the second half to completely baffle the Kirkland Lake team. In place of the incomplete forwards that they threw in the first half they substituted line bucks and quarterback sneaks for big gains.

The first touch of the game came when the Maroons blocked a kick by Drew and recovered the ball six yards from the line. On the first play after they took possession of the ball Clay Armstrong flipped a lateral pass to Jimmy McNiven who raced across the line for the first count.

It wasn't till near the end of the third quarter that the Blue and White were able to knot the count. Near the end

of that quarter Barry Howey fumbled a Timmins kick and it rolled over the line and Chalmers fell on it for the touchdown. Drew kicked the convert for the one point lead that gave Timmins their victory.

In last quarter Maroons tried desperately to get their lead back but the Blue and White lines held firm. The Maroons tried several lateral passes that were stopped before they could get far enough to constitute a gain. In the dying minutes of the game the Maroons tried a fast passing play that was to have ended in a long forward pass but it was not completed.

Bert Corbeau Has Twenty-One Men Trying Out for his Squad This Year. Will Play Hollinger on Saturday Night and Will Enter Lions Club Tournament.

The 1941-1942 hockey season will be officially opened in the Porcupine Camp to-morrow night when Bert Corbeau's Atlantic City Sea Gulls and Bob Crosby's McIntyre Miners clash in the first exhibition tilt of the season. Ice has been laid in the spacious McIntyre Arena for more than a week now and both teams have had a few days' practice. Saturday night the Sea Gulls will meet the Hollinger Greenshirts in another exhibition.

Bert Corbeau's Atlantic City Sea Gulls, United States Amateur champions last year, have been stripped of a number of stars. Only four of last year's team members are left.

Some of them have left for new pastures while a number of them have turned professional. The four men who played for the team last year and who are still around this season are: Leo Richard, Stew Cheetham, Alf Webster and Nels Dixon. These men are all fairly sure of catching a berth with this year's fast travelling team.

New men on this year's list of players who are trying out for a spot on the team include boys who have played in this district. One of them is Hal Gordon, former McIntyre goalie. "Toad" White, Frank Fasano, brother of Sammy Fasano, who campaigned here for years, Edward Konepeky, Edward Redman, Tommy Burlington, Jack Stoker, Alex Cunningham, Fraser Bowman, Jack Kitts, J. Horrick, L. Horrick, Jack Marinoff, Borden Wheeler, Greg. Kirby, Louis Brunelle and Norman Miles. These men are all new and are trying for a spot on the championship aggregation.

From that list of players Corbeau expects to round out another team that will take this year's championship again.

Corbeau has a splendid record in connection with this district. In the three years that he has travelled to this district he has picked up five players from here and at the present time they are all playing in the professional ranks. Three of the players who are well-known here and who graduated recently are, Sammy Fasano, Hec Pozzo and Blink Bellinger. Pozzo and Fasano both played for the Macs in past years, while Bellinger campaigned in Sudbury and Kirkland Lake.

The big barrel-chested coach is tough and he likes to hand it out to his players. He never asks a player to do anything that he can't do himself, though. His system has worked fine because he has one of the best records in amateur hockey for turning out good players. He pointed out that a player from a district such as the Porcupine might play here for his entire career and never attract the attention of a big league scout. When his team is playing, there is usually a major league scout in the audience and if a player looks good he is usually snapped up.

A player has a better chance to prove himself on Bert's team too. The regular schedule of the Atlantic City Sea Gulls is about three times as long as the regular season in any of the other amateur leagues and a player who reaches his peak at the end of the season in another league, reaches that
