Essletine's Bisons Show No Mercy As They Post 11-0 Win

Atlantic City Sea Gulls Prove No Match for Last Year's Northern Ontario Champions. Herbie Carnegie Hurt in First Period of Rough Game.

Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons eliminated the Atlantic City Sea Gulls from further competition in the Lions Club pre-season series at the McIntyre Arena last night in no uncertain manner as they trounced them 11-0. The Bisons showed more power than the Gulls in every department in last night's game and from the first glimpses of the team it looks as though the Bisons are headed for an even more successful season than they enjoyed last year.

The eleven goals were evenly distributed throughout the game with four coming in each of the first two periods and three in the last canto. The game featured lots of rough play and high sticks and the two busiest men on the ice were Frank Frawley and Joe Raybould as they waved one man after another to the penalty bench. Sixteen penalties in all were handed out with eleven of them coming in the first period.

Midway through the first period a free-for-all broke out when Leo Richard checked Herbie Carnegie hard into the boards. The little darkie picked himself up and started to throw punches at Richard and that was the sign for everybody else to get into it. Four penalties were handed out after it cooled down.

Curiously enough with eleven goals being scored only two men were able to get two of them. Allen and Ossie Carnegie bagged a pair each and the other seven were distributed evenly among seven other players. The best line on the ice was the new Ankerite line of the two Carnegie brothers and Manny McIntyre.

Alex Brownlee, in the Bison nets played a marvellous game and although he didn't have so very many shots to handle he did a good job with what he did have. Redmond, in the Gull nest for the first two periods never had a chance to stem the tide of rubber that floated his way.
