Domestic Science Expert Answers Questions by Reader. Menu Might Include Baked Ham, Fresh Tongue, Scalloped Oysters and Apple Turnover. Some Recipes.

A reader is planning a buffet supper for forty. The central note will be furnished by baked ham and tongue. With ham, I suggest that you use the fresh rather than the smoked tongue.

The hostess asks for suggestions as to what hot dish might be served with the cold meat. The first which comes to mind at this time of year is scalloped oysters. Then there is that standard dish, scalloped potatoes, which may be replaced by potatoes with cheese sauce or with sweet potatoes mashed with pineapple.

Preparations for these dishes may be made in advance, placed in casserole, reheated and allowed to brown in the oven when you are ready to serve them. If you wish to serve another vegetable, choose one which can be prepared on top of the stove as your oven will be packed to capacity when you are serving forty. Eggplant with tomatoes, string beans with celery, or peas in cream are all suitable choices.

When you are serving such a large number preparations for dessert must be made ahead. Pumpkin tarts or apple tournovers might be served, or you may like to serve mixed sliced fruit and speeches including Hitler's official tied together with brandy or rum and garnished with meringue shells. the dessert is served individually the fruit may be placed on small sponge cakes or squares of angel food. Whipped cream may be passed if you like.

Eggplant Turkish Style 1/2 cup salad oil

1 clove garlic, peeled 1/2 cup sliced onions

¼ cup minced green pepper 1 medium-sized eggplant, pared and

2 cups canned tomatoes or chopped

fresh tomatoes. 1 teaspoon sat.

Heat salad oil in heavy frying pan and saute garlic three minutes. Remove garlic. Add onions, green pepper, and eggplant and cook three minutes. Add tomatoes. (If fresh, peel and chop). Add salt, and cook slowly over low fire until eggplant is tender, about Soldier. twenty minutes. Add more salt if necessary. Yield, six servings.

Note-Bacon fat may replace salad oil. If desired, add one cup diced cooked meat with the tomatoes.

Meringues 3 egg whites

% cup sugar Dash of salt

½ teaspoon vanilla extract

Beat the egg whites until stiff and dry. Beat in gradually one-half cup sugar and the salt. Fold in remaining sugar and vanilla extract. Drop meringues by tablespoonfuls on ungreased baking sheet, piling mixture high in centre. Bake in slow oven (275 degrees Fahrenheit) about forty to forty-five minutes, until meringues are dry on the surface and will slip off the sheet easily. Remove from sheet with wet knife. If meringues are to be served with ice cream, press in bottom crusts. Yield, ten medium-sized or eighteen small meringues or kisses. (Released by The Bell Syndicate, Inc.)
