Dome Porkies are Crowned Lions' Club Champions on Monday Night at McIntyre

For the First Time in Years the Dome are Winning Their Early Games. Have Played Three Games to Date and Have Not Yet Tasted Defeat. Pirie Shoots Winning Marker.

Dome Porkies won the Lions Club pre-season series on Monday night when they defeated the highly-rated Hollinger Greenshirts 3-4. Neil Pirie scored the winning goal with three minutes left in the last period when he skated around a former team-mate, Mickey McKay, to make the former Dome defenceman look silly. Coasting in on Bentley he slapped in the rubber easily.

Maki was chased for tripping and the Greenshirts put on the power but they were unable to score. Just as Maki stepped back to the ice, Bruce had taken possession of the puck, and the blood centre-ice star was just in time to get into the play.

Bill Wilson was chased for slashing shortly after but the Dome were unable to penetrate the tough Hollinger defence and goal. George Lever was then chased and the Hollinger tried their luck but couldn't score.

Mike Horbul tied up the game for the Greenshirts just after the second frame started when he slapped in a pass from Baker. The pass was made from the corner and Horbul was in front of the goal mouth. A couple of minutes later Haneberry put the Greenshirts in front for the first time in the game when he slapped in Horbul's perfect pass to the goal mouth.

McGinn, Bruce and Murdoch worked into the Hollinger defence area shortly after on a nice passing play that produced results when McGinn slapped home the pass to knot the count. In a mixed up play that started in behind the Hollinger goal the Dome tied up the game. The loose puck was behind the net and Nevins went in after it. He passed it out to Maki and the puck was again shot in behind the net. Nevins again went in after it and passed to the other side of the net and still behind to Maki. Maki passed quickly out to the front where Billy Harris drove it in. It was a fast play and was completed before Bentley knew what was going on.

Penalties came in a rush in the last period and in the first ten minutes three men had taken trips to the box. Lever was chased for high-sticking and Linton went the same way for tripping. McKay was caught using his knee on Bruce and he was given a ticket.

Finally George Lever had a chance to score and he made no mistake. Woon played around behind the net with the puck and when he was clear, he gave Lever a perfect pass in front. Lever drove the puck home and Woon collapsed on the ice. Woon was taken off the ice with a sore leg.

Hollinger Trims Bisons in Lions Series Semi-Final

The Hollinger Greenshirts rode roughshod over the Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons, last year's Northern Ontario champions, on Friday night at the McIntyre Arena in the semi-final of the Lions Club pre-season series. The Greenshirts had drawn a bye into the semi-finals and the Ankerite lost the toss with the Dome and were forced to meet the Hollinger in the semi-final. The game was never in doubt, with the Hollinger team taking a three-goal lead in the first period and holding it till the end of the game.

Herbie Carnegie, who was hurt in the game between the Bisons and the Atlantic City team, was still on the sidelines and was missed by the other portion of the highly-regarded coloured line. The coloured line, with Morris at centre, were only able to score one goal. Hughie Allen was also out.

Early in the game Maurice Villeneuve sent the Greenshirts into a lead and about four minutes later Wink Wilson made it two up. Baker from R. Wilson near the three-quarter mark made it three ahead before the Bisons answered. Ossie Carnegie rifled a shot past Bentley two minutes later for the Herd's first score.

Each team scored a single goal in the second with Mike Horbul firing the first shot. Four minutes later Gordon scored for the Bisons on a pass from Ladds.

Ankerite scored their third goal shortly after the start of hostilities in the last session only to be followed by two more Hollinger tallies that made certain of the win. Joe Delmonte

streaked through the Bison defence for the first one and "Tic" Williams scored the second on a pass from Schwab.

The arrival of the various organizations in the parade and four of their members formed a guard of honour. The four members of the regiment stood at the four corners of the cenotaph resting their arms till Reveille sounded.

President of the Canadian Legion, Walter Greaves, introduced Major J. H. Cornthwaite, of the Salvation Army, who read the scriptures after the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers". Following the reading of the scriptures the first bomb was discharged to mark the start of the two minutes silence. Immediately after the bomb had exploded, Frank Pierce of the Trumpeters' Band blew the "Last Post" and just before the second bomb exploded the same bugler blew "Reveille". "The Lament" was played by a member of the Porcupine District Pipe Band.

Mayor Brunette was then called upon to say a few words and he spoke of the sacrifices that the men who served in the last war had made and said that the nation should rise up as a whole again. He asked that the people of today reflect on the actions of those brave men who gave their lives in the last struggle.

The gathering then sang, "O God Our Help in Ages Past," and then Rev. Norman Healey of the Schumacher United Church gave a short talk. He spoke of the people in France, Belgium, Holland and the other conquered countries and said that every sacrifice would be made till they were liberated. He asked that those people be brave and that in time they would regain their former freedom.
