Reeve V. H. Evans Re-elected for 1942 by Acclamation

Nine Standing for Township Council. Review of Year's Work by Reeve Evans

South Porcupine, Nov. 25 — (Special to The Advance)—Nomination day in Tisdale caused very little stir in town, very few people attending at the town hall for the nominations. Those nominated were:—Reeve V. H. Evans, no contestants therefore Reeve for 1942 by acclamation. The four township councillors for 1941—Dr. B. H. Harper, Dr. E. S. Somerville, Mr. Melvin Cavanaugh and Mr. Wm. Fairhurst—were nominated for 1942—as were also Geo. F. Helmer, Vaino Leukkonen, Mrs. Florence Jenkyn, Mr. Herb Mackey, Mr. W. G. Smith, Mr. Kenneth Kilborne, Mr. James Dillon, Mr. W. C. Arnott. Of the twelve thus nominated for the township council, three—Messrs Fairhurst, Dillon and Arnott—failed to qualify before nine o'clock Saturday night, thus leaving nine to contest the four seats.

Reeve Evans gave an account of the township improvements and work during the past year's tenure of office. The Public Works Committee have expended \$195,000 during 1941. This includes all snow removal, snow-ploughing, improvements of streets and roads, operation and maintenance of works department and street lighting. During the year over 6,000 lineal feet of 24' roadway to the Dome and 3,500 running feet of improved asphalt pavement have been constructed. The Vipond road has been resurfaced and First avenue, Schumacher, from east to west to Railroad St., Schumacher, 1,200 lineal feet of McIntyre road also improved; altogether three miles of improved type asphalt pavement. This has used 6,500 tons of asphalt, 27,000 gallons of oil and 70 tons of calcium chloride have been used for road work.

11,500 yards of pit run gravel and 15,000 yards of crushed and 14,000 yards of mine rock have been used. In Schumacher all lanes have been gravelled and 54 service connections in waterworks renewed, also 350 feet of sanitary sewer installed on Pine St. Also a 14" control valve on Timmins-Tisdale boundary controls more effectively the Schumacher water supply. In Bousseau townsite 900 feet of domestic water main has been installed. In South Porcupine a larger domestic sanitary and fire main has been installed recently from Strachan N. to Bruce Ave.

In South Porcupine a new 6" meter has been put in to check on the South Porcupine water supply. 1,150 feet of storm sewer has been installed throughout the township, an asphalt mixing plant purchased—the only one north of North Bay—cost \$6,600.

5,000 lineal feet of sidewalks have been renewed. The Fire and Light Committee and Public Welfare report both Fire Chiefs enjoyed enviable publicity in Northern, Dominion, Provincial and local organizations in fire prevention week, South Porcupine gaining first place in this

in the province for the size of the town and Schumacher seventh. In Public Welfare the institution of a V.O.N. branch has received more help from the township than called for—both for transportation and office service. Reeve Evans complimented all chiefs of staff in the township for the excellent work of their departments. Chief Melnik, Max Smith, Pat Murphy, Clarence Anderson, all receiving word of praise.

In Police work a survey of the township established a beat system of patrolling, and the traffic guardian system of school areas for child safety at traffic crossing. A special advance system of calling in taxes has eliminated interest in payments on temporary loans, a saving of \$1,500 being attributed to the tax prepayment scheme.

The tax rate in Schumacher was reduced from 37.25 mills to 33.37. In S. No. 1 the rate of 39.59 mills was maintained and not increased. The per capita debt rate is now \$58 instead of \$110. Last year at this time the township showed a surplus of \$28,000 and at the end of 1940—\$4,500. This year shows a surplus of \$24,000, and by the end of the year the budget will break even. Reeve Evans hopes that the 1942 council will be elected with an eye to wartime administration which should be—To consider economy, and avoid public borrowing—to make public works projects with after-war development and employment in view—to eliminate unnecessary costs and to pursue activities as well as is possible in wartime.

A meeting of candidates for council will be held in the town hall on Thursday (tonight) at 8 p.m. In Schumacher on Sunday night in the theatre.

Corrigan Funeral Will be Held Here Tomorrow Afternoon

Mervyn Corrigan, 38 Years Old, Died Here Yesterday Morning.

The funeral of the late Mervyn Corrigan, 12 Carlin avenue, will be held in Timmins tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The thirty-eight-year-old man died here shortly after eight o'clock yesterday morning. About seven-thirty yesterday morning the Timmins police were called to 12 Carlin avenue for assistance. When they arrived they found that Mr. Corrigan had slashed his throat with a razor blade. At the time that the police arrived Mr. Corrigan was being treated by Dr. H. G. Metcalf. Shortly after eight o'clock the man died. Dr. H. L. Minthorn was then called to the scene and after examination he decided that no inquest would be held.

Police said that they discovered that the man had been despondent for some time previous to the unfortunate incident. When they arrived at the house the injured man was still mumbling and talking. Mrs. Corrigan said that her husband had got up early and gone to the bathroom. He had been there for about ten minutes and she thought that there was a strange quietness as she went to investigate. It was then that she discovered her husband on the floor with his throat slashed. She immediately phoned for a doctor and the police.

The late Mervyn Corrigan was a resident of Timmins for a number of years and at the time of his death he was employed at the McIntyre Porcupine Mines where it is understood he was a spare shifter. He leaves to survive him a wife and two children.
