

GREENSHIRTS CLOSE IN ON ANKERITE

Only Single Point Is Separating Ankerite And Hollinger Now

Greenshirts Stage Strong Finish in Last Night's Third Period to Take Verdict Over Dome. First Two Periods Slow With No Scoring. Hollinger Juggles Lines.

Staging a strong finish in the last period of their game against Dome at the McIntyre Arena last night, the Hollinger Greenshirts won a 3-1 win over the South Porcupine team. Scoring a goal apiece in the second period after being held scoreless in the first period the Hollinger sneaked away in the last canto and hung up two goals while the Dome were held scoreless. The win sent the Greenshirts to within one point of the league-leading Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons and placed the Porkies farther into the league cellar.

Coach Bill Gagnon broke up a powerful scoring threat last night as he switched players from one line to another in an attempt to obtain a well-balanced club and the idea worked. He broke his first string forward line and showed Haneberry on the second line while Wink Wilson replaced him to play with Horul and Bill Wilson.

For the first two periods the game was a rather tame affair with no scoring and few penalties. Neither of the teams showed the kind of hockey that they are capable of playing and it wasn't till near the end of the game that the game started to speed up.

Police Use Diver in Attempt to Locate Drowned Boy

Police Have Given Up Hope of Finding Six-Year-old Marcel Dupont.

Firemen continued to drag the waters of the Mattagami River last Thursday afternoon for the boy of six-year-old Marcel Dupont who was drowned shortly after noon on Thursday, and then they ceased dragging operations. The bottom of the river at the point where the young lad was reported to have slipped in was very dirty and was covered with branches and roots.

On Friday another method was brought into action in an attempt to locate the body but it didn't turn out to be successful either. Theo Larriere, a diver, was employed and he dived all afternoon on Friday and Saturday but didn't locate any clue as to the whereabouts of the body. Larriere, who has had years of experience and who owns a regulation diving suit, went into the water and thoroughly searched the spot where the drowning was said to have taken place and located a milk bottle that the young lad was reported to have been carrying with him.

Relatives and others have continued the search since the week-end, but police have abandoned the search and have given up hope that the body will be recovered. Police believe that the body may have been carried out into the deep water and was then swept down the river under the ice.

Ankerite Takes Thrilling Win From Hollinger Last Saturday Night in Goal Tenders' Battle

Emerge Winners Two to One in Game that Carried Everything. Ankerite Lost Herbie Carnegie and Eddie Patton Through Injuries. Bisons Pass Greenshirts in the Standing.

The Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons bested the Hollinger Greenshirts on Saturday night at the McIntyre Arena when they took a two to one decision from the gallant Greenshirts. It was definitely a goal tenders' battle with Brownlee having a bit of an edge. Both Brownlee and Bentley played sensationally throughout the night and were without doubt the pick of the players.

Time and again either of the goalkeepers would be called upon to make almost impossible stops and each time they came through and delivered the goods. Brownlee, especially, shone in the last period when the Greenshirts threw five forwards on the ice for the whole period in an attempt to get the equalizer. In the last minute the Greenshirts took out Bentley and used six forwards but the stone wall of defence in front of the Ankerite citadel held well.

Ankerite won the game but they suffered a big loss in injuries when they lost Herbie Carnegie and Eddie Patton. In their last two games the Bisons have lost four men and this factor may have a bearing on their future games. They can't keep throwing men out on the ice and lose them at the rate of two every game. The last game the Ankerite played, they lost Roy Hawkey when he joined the R.C.A.F., and they lost Hughie Alley when he suffered a bad gash in his left leg. Now Herbie Carnegie with a torn ligament in his knee and Eddie Patton with a chipped ankle bone, have been added to the list.

Throughout the first period play ranged from end to end on nice pattern plays that blew up at the goal mouth. Both Brownlee and Bentley rose to great heights to save some of the shots that were tickled. Four penalties in the first period gave each team a chance to work out their power attacks but these attacks were useless against the brilliant net work of the two goalies. The Williams skated right in on Brownlee alone and took three shots that the former Dome custodian turned aside.

The second period started out the same way and for the first half of the canto the play was very rough. At the nine-minute mark Herbie Carnegie was given a heavy body check by Mickey McKay and had to be taken from the game. It was later learned that he suffered a torn ligament in the knee from the collision with the Greenshirt defenceman.

McIntyre Passes Dome Friday Night When They Fashion Out 7-4 Win. Teams Change Places

High-Scoring Game Failed to Produce Much Good Hockey But Did Hand Out Plenty in Goals and Penalties. Fifteen Misdeeds Committed During Battle.

McIntyre Miners went on a goal-scoring spree on Friday night of last week when they met the Dome Porkies at the McIntyre Arena and when the game was over they were leading by four goals. The win put them ahead of Dome and it was sweet revenge for them after having dropped a three-to-two verdict at the Dome the previous Tuesday night. Only in the first period were the McIntyre pucksters headed but before the second period was over they had their lead and then held it for the remainder of the game. The Macs ran up a big lead when they scored four more goals in the last period while the Dome got two.

Best line on the ice was the Dome first string of Myles, Murdock and Bruce. They scored three of their team's four goals and were a menace every time they stepped to the ice. Another of the stars was Teddy Lister, McIntyre forward, who pumped in two of McIntyre's seven goals. Webster, on the McIntyre front line, played his usual steady and consistent game, getting one goal and two assists.

It was Spaky Vail, big Mac defenceman who scored the game's first goal and sent the Macs into an early first period lead. He slapped in a pass from Webster to give the Macs the edge in the first four minutes of play.

Almost at the nine-minute mark Andy Bruce fired his first goal of the night on a nice passing play with Myles and Murdock. Three minutes later Bud Hume sent the Porkies ahead when he scored on a pass from Cyclone Taylor. Bill Maki was off the ice when the Dome scored on a break-away from a McIntyre power play.

The Macs pulled up their socks in the second period and scored two goals to take the lead while they held the Porkies scoreless. Teddy Lister scored the first one when he banged in a pass from Grabowski. Just near the end of the period Jackie Drummond scored when he took part in a passing play with Webster and Baker. It was a nice short passing play with the puck changing possession all the way through the team.

The Macs started fast in the last period and kept the pressure on continually, scoring two goals to the Porkies' one and doing the same thing over again as soon as the Porkies scored. Alf Webster pumped in the first one after little more than a minute of play. Bishop slapped one in at the four-minute to give the Macs a clear lead of three goals.

Hollinger Greenshirts go Down to Second Straight Defeat at the Hands of Buffalo-Ankerite

Battling Bisons Fight from Behind Three Goal Deficit in First Period to Win 7-4 Victory. Barney Morris Scores Three Goals. Ankerite Now Leads Loop.

Hobe Essletine's battling Buffalo-Ankerite Bisons fought back from a four-to-one deficit at the end of the first period in Monday night's game with the Hollinger Greenshirts at the McIntyre Arena and finished the game on the long end of a seven to four count. It was the second straight win for the Bisons over the Hollinger crew and placed them well out in front in the league race.

Hollinger built up a three-goal lead in the first period after Barney Morris had fired the first goal of the game for the Bisons but in the last two periods the gallant Bisons fought back furiously and kept the Greenshirts snipers off the score sheet while they scored six goals for themselves. It was a real story-book finish and was another example of the indomitable spirit of the Herd.

Barney Morris, former centre ice star and now one of the league's leading defencemen, was the outstanding hero of the game with three goals to his credit, while he did a masterful blue line job. He scored the first goal of the game for the Bisons and then saw the Greenshirts build up a three-goal lead in the first period. In the second period Morris continued the steady pounding at the Hollinger goal and was successful in scoring two more goals besides keeping his portion of the blue line well guarded.

About seven minutes after Morris had sent the Herd into the lead in the first period the Greenshirts threw on a power attack when they released the full power of their first line of Wilson, Haneberry and Horbul. Haneberry scored the first one on passes from Wilson and Horbul and then Frank Baker sent the Hollinger into the lead when he scored on a pass from Villeneuve. Near the end of the period Wilson and Horbul scored two fast goals on passes from Haneberry.

In the second canto the Bisons put

on the pressure and left the ice at the end of the period with a one-goal lead. Ladds scored the first one near the beginning of the period. Morris then cruised in for a brace of goals and Lahti finished the period's scoring with about three minutes left.

Ladds scored the first goal of the last period when he slapped in a pass from Lahti and then big Ossie Carnegie completed the scoring on a puck passed from McIntyre and Jack Young.
