

# Dome Hands Ankerite First Defeat 3 -2

## Close Race Developing in End of First Half of Commercial Bowling Between 2 Teams

### Only Two Points Separate Gambles and The Advance as Final Games of First Half Come up Next Monday Night. Gambles Must Sweep All Points to Finish Winners.

Gambles closed up part of the 3-point gap between The Advance and themselves on Monday night in the regular weekly session of the Commercial Bowling league when they took one point from the Power team while The Advance was losing three points to the T. & N. O. Two points separate the two teams now as they go into the stretch in the last game of the first half next Monday night. In next Monday night's fixture between the two top teams Gambles must take all points to win. One point for The Advance will give them the championship of the first half.

In the absence of Pete Nicolson, who was at home sick, Johnny Moss took over the top scoring rung of the Gambles team. He bowled in Pete's spot and turned in a nice total of 674 and contributed 275 of those points in the second game that went to the Gambles entry by over a hundred pins.

Teddy Towers led the Power to their win in the first game with a count of 253, while Salomaa turned in a 212 count. In the second game Moss' 275 shaded all other scores as the Gambles team soared over the eleven hundred mark. Lamber, kicked in a 237 score and Horrester rolled a 231 count while Teckney scored 215. Threatening on the Power side of the sheet were the scores of Bill McHugh, Teddy Towers and Dawson. They rolled 231, 212 and 211, respectively.

Dawson turned in a 258 count in the third game to send the Power team home with a win. His score was the only Power score that topped two hundred but it was enough to give the electricians the game by 96 pins. Horrester argued for the losers but it was a losing argument. Horrester scored 232 while Johnny Moss got 227 and Gagnon got 212.

On the other two alleys the T. & N. O. aggregation were whittling The Advance team down to their size and they did a convincing job as they tucked away a three-point win. Tommy Bonnah, who has been carrying the mail for the printers all the way through the season so far, slipped badly and the team slipped with him. His poorest total of the season and one of the few that has fallen below the seven hundred mark put in an appearance on Monday night as he rolled a three-game score of 506.

Eric Fleming and Joe Toal were the heavy artillery that finally stopped The Advance team cold. Fleming turned in a nice 730 total and Toal scored 701 for his three games. Alvin Leach rolled the only other T. & N. O. score over the six hundred when he scored 656 in three games. Guidice was the only printer to top six hundred. He rolled 639.

Fleming's 319 left no doubt as to the winner in the first game. This win was helped a lot by Bonnah's 102 for the printers. Toal and Leach led the railroaders in the second game as they counted two scores of 272 and 257. The same two men led again in the last game and were helped by Fleming who rolled 235. Leach had 237 and Toal 247.

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## Weight-Lifters at T.P.A.A. Card Set New Records

New Marks are Unofficial, However. Albert Lepic Tops Canadian Mark by 37 lbs.

A packed house saw the opening show of the Timmins Police Amateur Athletic Association at the "K" Club hall last night and after the show was over the fans went home talking to themselves. It was the biggest thirty-five cents worth that Mr. Sport Fan has ever received in Timmins. Three Canadian championships were broken in the weight-lifting exhibition that followed the nine boxing contests.

The three records that fell by the wayside were the heavyweight straight press, the light-heavyweight snatch and the middleweight snatch. Albert Lepic, burly police sergeant, was the hit of the show and he gave the fans their money's worth as he raised the Canadian record for the heavyweight straight press by thirty-seven pounds. The record is 223 lbs. and Albert calmly lifted a weight of 255 lbs. over his head. He didn't even strip down to his tighties to do the job but was fully clothed.

Constable Harold Brown broke the existing Canadian light-heavyweight title when he hoisted a weight of 235 lbs. over his head in a snap. The old mark for the light-heavyweights was 225 lbs. Ernie Eass-ville chopped a big chunk off the middleweight record in a snap lift to complete the breaking of records for the night.

Other weight lifters who did their best to break records but missed, although they were part of a fine show, were: Stuart Kzellstrom, Sam Fistowsky, Ted Cunningham and Paul Turpin. Besides doing some weight-lifting Turpin put on an exhibition on the high bars at the end of the performance that took the fancy of all. He is a fine performer having put on exhibitions at Montreal and Ottawa. His balancing and other tricks on the somewhat unsteady high bar were really crowd-pleasing.

Karl Snyder's boys put on a fine boxing card to start the evening off right. Karl has spent much time with the boys, showing them the finer points of the manly art and his efforts are being rewarded now. He is turning out a fine bunch of boxers, who wanted to do everything they could for the T.P.A.A.

The main bout saw Maurice Lavigne add another name to his already long list of victories. This time he took the measure of Maurice Duclume, who built up a nice record here a couple of years ago. Lavigne has looked well in all his appearances here so far and should go a long way. The last time he fought here was at the same hall on the "K" Club card when he took an easy decision from Alcide Therriault. Both Lavigne and Duclume weighed in at 135 lbs. and Lavigne had little trouble getting the nod of the judges. Bud Snyder handed the refereeing duties.

Ollie Proulx, who for years was the fastest man on skates in this neck of the woods, and who won championships with his intermediate team, the Monarchs, a couple of years ago, has been the brains behind the Porkie hockey machine for the last two games and the team has shown a definite improvement.

Although the game started to get rough in the last period and the overtime last night, there was no denying the fighting Porkie machine, once they got going. They sat back and saw the Herd hang up a one-goal lead in the first period and then they went into the second period playing their hearts out to knot the count. The second canto ended with the Porkies still one goal down. In the third period it was sheer pressure around the Bison nets that allowed the Dome fighters to tie the game after about four minutes of play.

Three minutes later they were down again but they stayed in there fighting and a minute later they again tied the game. They held the strong Ankerite first string forwards of Carnegie, Young and McIntyre, back well and the period ended with the score tied.
