Appeal is Issued to Veterans of Last Great War

Recruiting officials issued an appeal yesterday to all veterans of the last war who would like to see service again in this war. The government has ordered the organizing of another two companies of the Veteran Guards of Canada for active service.

The government handed the authority for the organizing of the two companies to the headquarters of Military District No. 2 in Toronto and the appeal came from Toronto this week. The companies must be recruited immediately and any person signifying his intention of joining can receive his medical examination at any of the recruiting offices.

It is stipulated that the companies will be attached to Military District No. 11 (British Columbia) and the recent turn in the world events with the Pacific coast in danger has made the strengthening of the western guard units a necessity. The two new companies will be known as No. 11, "C" Company and No. 11 "D" Company. Qualifications for any veteran wanting to join are that they must have seen service in the Great War, 1914-1918. They must be fifty years of age or under. They must be in Categories "A" to "C-2."

Recruiting officials in Timmins said they were authorized to recruit every available man who can qualify in Timmins and district.

Young Men Wanted Now to Learn Air Force Trades
