### Fire Chief Presented With Handsome Wrist Watch.

South Porcupine, Dec. 29 — (Special to The Advance)—The festive season is once more past and gone. South Porcupine celebrated quietly. The churches were filled for the Christmas services, especially for the Catholic midnight mass, at which the music was especially beautiful. Carol singing was a feature at the Anglican service on Sunday night. On the Tuesday preceding Christmas Eve, the children of our community, who have for the past few years expected Santa Claus to visit the Christmas tree erected by the South Porcupine Fire Department, outside the fire hall, were not disappointed.

The alarm sounded at 6.15 p.m. and by 6.30 the street in front of the hall was crowded with youngsters, all eager to see and greet the representative of the Christmas Saint.

The roof of the Fire Hall was pretty icy and slippery, and as the old chap isn't as young as he was once, he thought it safer this year to come in on the fire truck.

Nobody witnessing the eager acclaim of the smaller children and the anticipation of the older ones, or who heard the convincing affirmations of the parents (fathers particularly) that "Here was really Santa Claus", would ever want the day to come when this pleasing ceremony should be discontinued.

Every "boy" in the Fire Department got a great kick out of helping Santa with his job. Eleven hundred bags each containing candies, orange and apple, were distributed and no child

(and no little brother or sister at home) went without.

The bags left over were taken later up to the hospital by the Girl Guides and every patient was made the recipient of a Christmas "thought" from St. Nicholas. These girls sang carols sweetly in the corridor of the hospital and helped to bring Christmas to the sick.

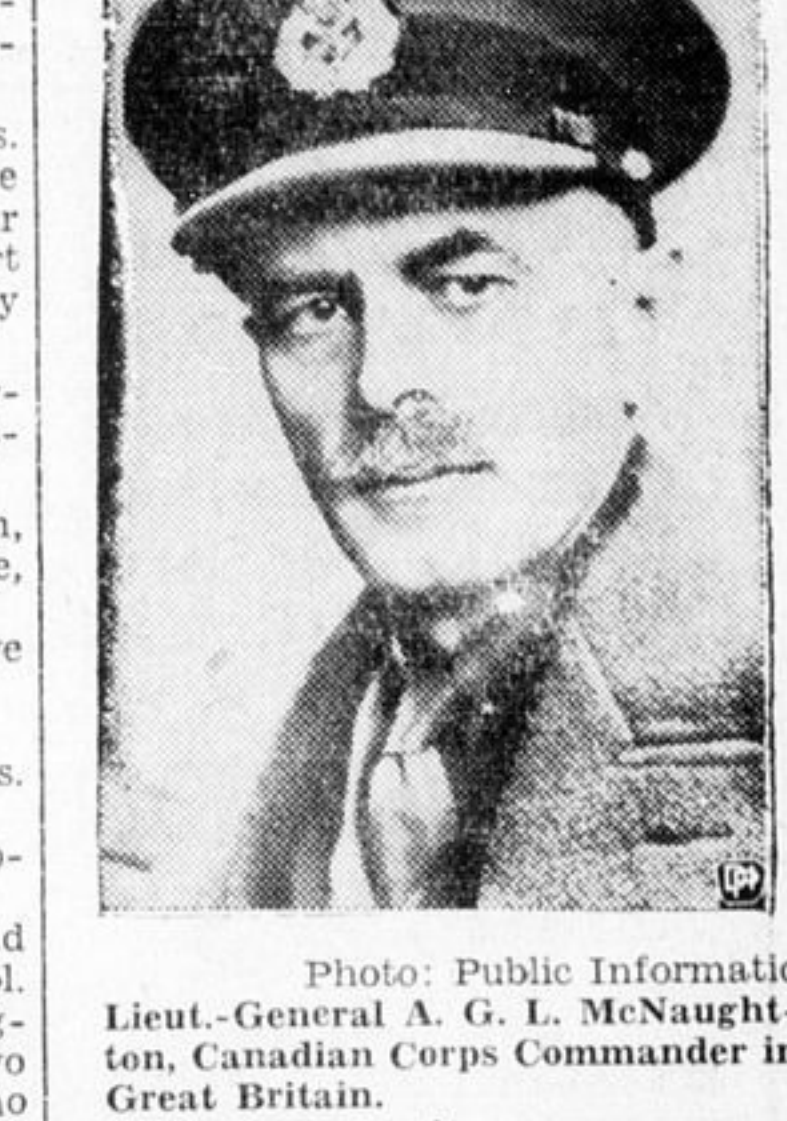
